

Library Services

There are over 100 public libraries in South Australia, five of which are in the City of Salisbury. Library membership is free, and provides access to all libraries within the state. Libraries are great places for people of all ages, abilities and cultures to meet, read, learn, use computer and internet facilities and access information. The new Salisbury Community Hub features a library which has two levels of community spaces, with a diverse book collection, computers and child and adult programs.

Library members can borrow items free of charge from any library. All items (except for toys, games and sport equipment) can be returned to any public library within South Australia, regardless of which library they were borrowed from.

Borrowable items include:

- Audiobooks

- CDs
- DVDs and Blu-rays
- Toys and games
- Sports equipment

Libraries also offer a range of services including:

Parks and Reserves

The City of Salisbury has over 170 beautiful parks, reserves, wetlands and playgrounds and over 50 kilometres of walking trails for residents and visitors to enjoy.

Over time, City of Salisbury has transformed its landscape to establish parklands, linear trails, reserves and outdoor recreation facilities.

A recycled water system consisting of 52 wetlands are used to irrigate our parks and open spaces, and support a healthy habitat for native fauna.

Walking and cycling trails throughout Salisbury include the Little Para Trails and Dry Creek Linear Park. Many of our larger parks and reserves incorporate safe children's playgrounds, picnic areas and free BBQs.

Dog Friendly Parks

Dog friendly parks are designated areas where dogs are permitted to be off-leash at any time. These parks have been specifically designed to offer an interesting environment for dogs and their owners. Dog waste bags are supplied at each park and dog owners are required to clean up after their dogs when in a public environment.

Pet dogs and cats are required to be de-sexed, microchipped and registered. If a roaming dog is found, please contact Council on **8406 8222**.

Bridgestone Reserve is a significant new parkland, athletics centre, recreation and fitness playspace for all ages, based in Salisbury.

Cobbler Creek Recreation Park

Smith Road, Salisbury East

Cobbler Creek connects through a hidden stream valley which meanders through Council reserves the Salisbury suburban landscape. The Recreation Park offers numerous recreational walking and off road cycling trails. Councils trail along the creek west of Bridge Road can be accessed from Spearman Avenue.

Pitman Park has two main areas that can be hired for weddings those being the Rose Garden and the waterfall areas.



Unity Park

(Incorporating an accessible playground for children in wheelchairs) South Terrace, Pooraka

The Unity Park Skate Facility is a superb street circuit of rails, ramps, boxes, slopes and quadrangles. The fitness station offers a great place to work out and test your endurance. The equal access playground has facilities for all ages.

Greenfields Watershed Wetlands

(Incorporating the Watershed Café and Function Centre) Salisbury Highway, Mawson Lakes

Greenfields Wetlands is an amazing 114 hectare constructed attraction in the heart of Salisbury's urban landscape in Mawson Lakes, just 15kms from Adelaide's CBD.

St Kilda Playground And Mangrove Trail (Incorporating regional adventure playground and nature walk) Mangrove Street, St Kilda

The playground offers many attractions including a huge castle with slides and a draw-bridge, bouncy boomerang, flying fox, pirate ship, a large volcano with multiple slides, a basketball court, swings and more.

Paddocks Wetlands Reserve

Cnr Bridge and Maxwell Roads, Para Hills

The Paddocks is a large expanse of land consisting of wide open sporting fields, bird and wildlife conservation wetlands and a fully enclosed, dog exercise yard.

Kaurna Park

Waterloo Corner Road, Burton

Kaurna Wetlands is a 48-hectare bushland haven of winding paths and boardwalks.

Fairbanks Drive Reserve

Fairbanks Drive, Paralowie

Fairbanks Drive Reserve offers a shared basketball and tennis court, play equipment and large grassed areas.



Living in Salisbury



Climate Change Refuge

Heat waves are becoming increasingly common in Australia and occur when the temperature is at or above 35°C for five days, or at or above 40°C for three days. It is important to stay hydrated, cool and indoors during extreme heat. Air-conditioned places such as shopping centres, hubs, libraries and community centres can offer refuge for everyone, particularly those without air-conditioned homes.

Waste Collection in Salisbury

The City of Salisbury, through the Northern Adelaide Waste Management Authority (NAWMA), empties your kerbside bins as part of your rates. All general waste, recycling and food and garden organics must be put in the correct kerbside bin for collection.

There are three different types of kerbside bins you can use:

- 1. The red-lid bin is for general household waste and is emptied by NAWMA once a week.
- 2. The yellow-lid bin is for recycling including plastic bottles, cans, paper, glass jars and bottles, cartons and cardboard. These items are recyclable, which means that they are collected, sorted and re-used to make other things. This bin is emptied by NAWMA every two weeks.
- 3. The green-lid bin is for food and organic waste, including food scraps, pizza boxes, tissues and paper towel, shredded paper, pet waste and garden waste. This bin is emptied by NAWMA every two weeks on the alternate week to the yellow lid bin.

A benchtop kitchen caddy for collection of food scraps is provided with the green-lid kerbside bin. If you require a caddy to use with an existing greenlid bin, you can collect one from the Salisbury Community Hub at 34 Church Street, Salisbury.

Important Notice

Bins should be put on the kerbside outside the front of your property before 7:00am on the day they are to be collected. Bins must be placed on the kerbside with the lid opening towards the road, a small distance apart from each other – the lid should be closed.

Resource Recovery Centres:

There are two Resource Recovery Centres (Edinburgh North and Pooraka) where City of Salisbury residents can donate, recycle and dispose of items that can't go in the kerbside bins. Quality household goods, building and garden items, electronic waste, car batteries, larger amounts of general waste, large loads of garden clippings and hazardous substances can be responsibly disposed of at these centres. Details about what is accepted at each of the centres and associated disposal fees are available on the NAWMA website.

Special Collection of Rubbish:

The City of Salisbury provides two free hard waste services per financial year. Residents may choose two services per financial year:

- 1. Hard waste drop-off service residents can drop off a 6 x 4 caged trailer amount of hard waste to a NAWMA Resource Recovery Centre free of charge.
- Hardwaste Home Collection Service Residents can book a home collection for 2 cubic metres of hard waste, with bookings collected within a 4 week period from the time of booking.
