

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

TOP RECOGNITION FOR FRANK

FOR many years, Kaurna Elder and local resident Frank Wanganeen has worked to share his knowledge and passion for Reconciliation, social justice, and Kaurna language and culture with our community.

Mr Wanganeen has lived in Adelaide for most of his life and in the City of Salisbury for the better part of 20 years. He is well known to many in the area as a deeply committed member of our community.

His vision of inclusiveness and strong community is well respected – and it has now been recognised with the 2017 Premier's NAIDOC Award. This prestigious award recognises the outstanding achievements and service of an extraordinary South Australian who has made a significant contribution to the lives of Aboriginal people.

Winning the Premier's NAIDOC Award was a privilege, said Mr Wanganeen. "It was unexpected, but it was very humbling to get," he said. "It recognises you for your contribution, for the things you've been doing for your community."

The City of Salisbury is extremely grateful to Mr Wanganeen for his ongoing involvement. He is the Chairperson of Council's Reconciliation Action Plan Working Group. He presents 'Welcome to Country' at key events, is a valued cultural awareness presenter and community contact, and he works closely with Pooraka Farm Community Centre, including on the planning group for the annual NAIDOC event.

"I just wanted to give something back and create awareness in the wider community," he said of his decision to volunteer. "Since I've been with the Council, you can see the major changes they are trying to achieve in regards to Reconciliation."

Mr Wanganeen said he believes in a society where all members are equally respected. "We're a multicultural society," he said. "In some of the talks I do with multicultural groups it's interesting to find our similarities rather than our differences. If we can learn from each other I think it will make the community stronger."

Leaving a legacy of knowledge is Mr Wanganeen's ultimate vision. "You can't take knowledge where you're going," he said. 

CAR SHOW COMMEMORATES




SALISBURY hosted northern Adelaide's largest outdoor car showroom in October to celebrate and acknowledge almost 70 years of car manufacturing in Australia.

Hundreds of vehicles and an estimated 4,500 people attended the Aussie Era Salisbury Car Show on the weekend of GM Holden's Elizabeth operations closure to both say farewell and showcase their favourite Aussie-built machine.

Holden, Ford, Chrysler, Morris, Hillman, Purvis, Pontiac, Toyota, Nissan and many more were on display. Civic Square played host to kids playing on the Disney Cars bouncy castle, getting their faces painted with their favourite car logo, enjoying the community barbecue and coffee van, food vendors, checking out the SES, Moody Hues Gallery and vehicle trade displays. Even two local councillors, Betty Gill and Graham Reynolds, threw their support behind the day and entered their vehicles.

"With the overwhelming success of this year's event and the very positive feedback from entrants, vendors and the public, we are making this an annual event for Salisbury returning on Sunday 21 October in 2018," said Salisbury Business Association Executive Officer David Waylen.

NEW PLAY TIME AT SALISBURY

THIS year the City of Salisbury introduced a new events initiative to celebrate the great play spaces within the City.

Hosted at various sites, 'Salisbury Plays' offers free events for local families including come and try activities provided by local sporting groups, live music, free face-painting, a petting zoo, giant kid's games, activities and more.

At Salisbury Aware print deadline, a 'Salisbury Plays' event was planned to celebrate the St Kilda Precinct on Sunday 26 November. This popular site offers visitors an award-winning adventure playground, Adelaide Tramway Museum, Boat Club, Marina and the St Kilda Mangrove Trail and Interpretive Centre, which features a 2km boardwalk showcasing the mangrove forests of the Barker Inlet.

During September the inaugural 'Salisbury Plays' event was held at Bridgestone Reserve, with more than 1,500 people attending. This event celebrated the arrival of spring with free family activities, come



and try sports and entertainment. There was even a meet and greet with 'Sticks and Wombat' from Channel 9's The Block. The local 1st Salisbury Scouts provided a low cost sausage sizzle while other food and coffee vans had food and drinks available for purchase.

The event provided residents with the opportunity to learn more about Salisbury Water's harvesting program at the site. Opened earlier this year, Bridgestone Reserve offers a variety of play equipment, community recreation reserves, a fitness trail and water conservation projects.

Mayor Gillian Aldridge said 'Salisbury Plays' offers families a great opportunity to enjoy our flourishing City. "It was great to see so many people of all ages enjoying a picnic and day out in another one of our wonderful reserves," Mayor Aldridge said.

Northern Respite Care is a Low Cost, low level service provider offering three programs for care recipients living in the northern suburbs of Adelaide – one on one home visits, a Friday ladies outing group and a Wednesday Men's outing group.

Do you need a hand to assist you in continuing to care for your loved one? We can help you! Let us take away some of the stresses for both you as the carer and the care recipient – call us! Would you like to be a Volunteer in this amazing program? We can help you to help others!

The aim of the program is to meet the needs of carers of the frail and aged who live in the Salisbury, Playford and Tea Tree Gully Council areas in order to help them maintain, with maximum independence, their caring role and to enhance the quality of life for both the carer and the care recipient.

We achieve this through the commitment of a dedicated team of volunteers who provide services to the care recipient so the carer can have a break from the caring process.

Home visits entail a volunteer visiting either in the home or through outings for up to 4 hours each week or fortnight, while our Men's Outing service boasts a team of male volunteers who collect male care recipients each week for morning tea and then a lunch activity. Our women's outing group allows women to socialise with women on outings, with a dedicated team of female volunteers to assist them.

REMARKABLE RESIDENTS RECOGNISED

OUTSTANDING individuals and organisations helping make the City of Salisbury a wonderful place to live, work, play and study were recognised at the 2017 Legend Awards.

Presented by Mayor Gillian Aldridge at John Harvey Gallery in Salisbury, this prestigious annual program recognises a:

LIVING LEGEND: An individual or group improving quality of life in the City of Salisbury through learning, volunteering, environmental sustainability or community safety.

- WORKING LEGEND: An individual or group that is enhancing the City of Salisbury by showcasing business excellence, or an individual or group improving the City of Salisbury through their business collaborations, events or innovation.
- ACTIVE LEGEND: An individual or a group that has helped build pride and success in the City of Salisbury as a sportsperson, team, coach, umpire, official, artist or musician.
- MRS BAYNES AND MRS ROBERTS OUTSTANDING **CONTRIBUTION AWARD:** Presented to a City of Salisbury employee who demonstrates outstanding contributions in the areas of work, community and play.

WORKING LEGEND MICHAEL MANGOS

Michael Mangos, of Salisbury North, has been the Director of SA Structural for more than 15 years. The company and its projects speak for themselves including the new SA Medical Research Institute, The Adelaide Convention Centre, Burnside Village Shopping Centre, SA Health Medical Research



Institute and Rowlands Apartments - just to name a few. Mr Mangos has shown leadership in supporting the City of Salisbury community through the creation of opportunities, whether that be by providing apprenticeships, involving local university students in research projects or employing ex-automotive workers who have been displaced by the close of GM Holden.

SA Structural has three premises throughout the City of Salisbury including at Salisbury North and Pooraka. Their success and commitment to growing their business locally has been further reinforced after purchasing a 10,000-square metre facility at Edinburgh as their new headquarters.

This was a significant investment for their business and one that shows SA Structural is committed to the City of Salisbury and growing their business even further.

MAYOR'S COMMENDATION (WORKING) **CAMERON BENHAM**

Cameron Benham is a young entrepreneur from Mawson Lakes who, at the age of 14, started a monthly board game based



event called 'The Big Game Theory'. This has grown into an online store at thebiggametheory.com.au which offers a large selection of board games and associated products while also promoting his monthly events.

These are currently run from The Whitehorse Inn at Bolivar and bring together families and groups in a welcoming and social environment.

Cameron has organised events as large as 600 attendees, working with volunteers and community groups. For the past three years he has run the tabletop gaming section for Avcon at the Adelaide Convention Centre and is about to host an event for Hybrid World Adelaide - all while currently studying Year 12.

LIVING LEGEND SALISBURY STITCHERS INC.

Salisbury Stitchers truly is a hidden gem of the City of Salisbury. It began in 1991 when Carolyn Wall posted an expression of interest notice in the local paper to form a craft group. It attracted people from as far as the Barossa Valley, Henley Beach and Glenalta to join local people from Salisbury, Pooraka, Elizabeth, Golden Grove and many suburbs in between.

Salisbury Stitches became an incorporated body in December 1993, and since 16 September 1994 the group has been located at the Scout Hall on Orange Avenue in Salisbury. Their membership swelled to approximately 130 people. At present they have a membership of 68 with ages ranging from 40 to 90 years. They may not be a charity, but they have demonstrated many significant charitable deeds. Many, many hours have been spent designing, cutting and sewing beautiful patchwork guilts, baking for morning teas, candle wicking and even creating teddy bears to help raise money for charity or to donate to a baby, child or adult in need of care and comfort.

Salisbury Stitches has helped people in Africa, Kosovo, Vietnam and Borneo to name a few. Locally, donations have been made to the Royal Adelaide Hospital, Leukaemia Foundation, Can Do for Kids, Novita, Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, the Royal Flying Doctor

Service, Heart Kids, the Northern Area Domestic Violence Centre, Angel Flights, victims of the Victoria bushfires, trauma teddies for the South Australian Police Force to comfort traumatized adults and children, the Red Cross, Salisbury Meals on Wheels and many more. The oncology department at the Lyell McEwen Hospital has received approximately 200 guilts, and group members are currently working on a donation for people suffering from muscular dystrophy.

MRS BAYNES AND MRS ROBERTS **OUTSTANDING CONTRIBUTION AWARD MARY CERAVOLO**

Mary Ceravolo is the CaLD (Culturally and Linguistically Diverse) Program Coordinator within the Community Health and Wellbeing Division at the City of Salisbury.

She has a strong commitment to the Salisbury community,



not just as an employee of the City of Salisbury, but also by spending a great deal of time voluntarily working with the Bhutanese community as well as promoting women's wellbeing, personal growth and development in a range of community settings. Mary also works to support all people to achieve their greatest potential through creative activities and she weaves this approach into her daily work. During her nine years at the City of Salisbury, Mary has worked skilfully to support positive outcomes for older community members from the Bhutanese, Polish and Italian communities, and has contributed significantly to the cultural understandings of the broader organisation.

ACTIVE LEGEND - ELAINE FIGALLO

Elaine Figallo, of Paralowie, has been a respected stalwart of northern suburbs cricket for more than 30 years. Prior to stepping down from the Para Districts Cricket Association during the AGM in August, Elaine served 26 years

on the Executive Committee including the past eight seasons as President where she was instrumental in the development of cricket, particularly for juniors and women.

Elaine played a key role in the development of the Association's junior program some 30 years ago. Initially offering Under 14s and Under 16s, the



Under 12 competition was later added to allow children of all ages to play cricket. Throughout this time, Elaine helped her local Paralowie Cricket Club to field seven teams in the Association, which grew from 40 to 60 teams. Elaine was instrumental in the foundation of the Association's women's competition, which will celebrate its 20th year this season. This has been widely recognised as one of the first community cricket competitions for women in Australia, with other associations only now beginning to establish similar programs. This highlights Elaine's vision and leadership. As Association President, Elaine always made decisions considering the interests of the affiliated clubs and their members. Through her leadership, there are now more programs available than ever before for juniors, seniors and women to participate in cricket in the northern suburbs.

ACTION PLAN FOR EMPOWERING YOUTH

THE City of Salisbury recently launched the Youth Strategic Action Plan 2017-2021, which sets the foundations for Council's continuing efforts to help local youths reach their full potential.

"The City of Salisbury has more than 23,000 residents aged between 12 and 24 - and they hold the key to unlocking Salisbury's future," said Mayor Gillian Aldridge.

"The Plan builds on the youth development work we currently undertake across the City, but crucially, and through extensive consultation with youth in Salisbury, the new Plan is well-placed to respond to changing or emerging youth priorities that our young people have identified."

More than 1,500 young people took part in the consultation workshops, which were spearheaded by Salisbury Youth Council members. Many community groups, schools, organisations and individuals also assisted.

"By listening to our young people and acting on their suggestions we get the best results for our City," Mayor Aldridge said.

The Strategy will see Council focus its efforts in five key areas:

- Jobs and Education
- Health and Wellbeing
- Active and Creative Lifestyles
- Diversity
- Youth Participation

These five areas will form the basis of the City of Salisbury's youth planning framework. Strategies emanating from these five areas will provide a basis for specific programs, policies and activities to be introduced annually.

Through these key areas, strategic objectives have been identified that will assist Council to evaluate the ongoing effectiveness of youth programs, policies and activities.

LEARNING THROUGH LEGO

HAVE kids who love building with LEGO and are also interested in coding or robotics?

Held at the Mawson Centre, 'Mindstorms at Mawson' is a new addition to our community learning programs, giving kids the chance to get hands-on with robotics.

The new program is part of a focus on providing STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) programs for the Salisbury community in our Libraries and Community Centres. Engaging kids in these areas at a young age will be important for them as they prepare for jobs in an increasingly digital world.

Designed to complement work being done in schools, Mindstorms at Mawson is held during school term and contains five sessions held fortnightly afterschool. During each session,



students learn how to program using various motors and sensors on the LEGO Mindstorms EV3 robots by tackling different challenges.

It's not just about programming either. Students learn about problem solving, teamwork, communication and perseverance.

Don't forget - Salisbury eSports League events are now held monthly at Twelve25 Salisbury Youth Enterprise Centre with the next event (League of Legends 5v5) on Saturday 9 December.



DIGITAL SKILLS ACROSS THE GENERATIONS

GENERATION Connect is an exciting new project that connects seniors with young members of the Salisbury community to grow their digital skills.

Participants learn from each other while capturing stories of how technology has changed the lives of our older residents.

South Australia ranks second lowest in Australia for digital inclusion (The Australian Digital Inclusion Index 2017) and unfortunately the most socially excluded people, such as seniors, tend to be the most digitally excluded.

"It is vitally important to support seniors in the use of digital technology – it is such an important social tool," said Mayor Gillian Aldridge. "This is an amazing opportunity for the different generations to help and learn from each other."

Generation Connect will give senior participants an opportunity to think about how they've used technology throughout their lives. "Many in our community were born before the advent of television. There were certainly no computers, smart phones or internet," Mayor Aldridge said. "While today's technologies may seem very different and challenging, over their lives seniors have actually had to adapt to many big changes in technology."

Capturing these stories of technological change forms an important part of the project – and this is where the younger cohort of volunteers comes into play. Not only will they mentor the senior participants, teaching them useful skills in smart technologies, but they will also be learning themselves. They will be trained in basic videography, interviewing and editing, then they will collaborate with a senior participant to develop a short video documentary that tells their story.

The first round of the project is well underway, with the youth participants already being trained in mentoring and videography. The City of Salisbury will publish the video documentaries they develop, and they will also become part of Council's local history collection – an important recounting of the history of technology in Salisbury.

The second round of Generation Connect will launch in the early months of 2018.

FIRST LOOK AT PROPOSED COMMUNITY HUB

NEW opportunities for performance and entertainment spaces, a state-of-the-art learning, information centre and library hub, cultural centre and council services are some of the elements proposed for enhancing the Salisbury City Centre.

The City of Salisbury has released designs for the proposed \$43 million Salisbury City Centre Community Hub, which would provide residents with a once in a generation opportunity to have a contemporary space to meet, learn and do business, as the Council works towards investing in the future.

The Community Hub would be located on John Street between Civic Square and Parabanks Shopping Centre and feature a café, community terrace, public meeting rooms as well as a revitalised Civic Square, which will include a large outdoor digital screen to show performances and sporting events. The four-story building design also features a flexible gallery space that would easily be transformed to an inside and outside event space that can seat up to 500 people. This space would be used for school formals, graduations, plays, cultural events and ceremonies, as well as quality family events like the Salisbury Secret Garden and the Salisbury Food & Cultural Festival.

Mayor Gillian Aldridge said the designs are "incredibly exciting" and provide a clear insight into Council's renewal vision. "The design was always supposed to reflect our desire to make the Salisbury City Centre a connected and flowing community space where visitors feel welcome and exciting to come to our City," Mayor Aldridge said.



"The proposed building is filled with light, integrates well with the surrounding space and would be a modern and welcome addition to our City. The Community Hub will reenergise the CBD and provide a catalyst for investment in our centre."

Mayor Aldridge said the new library and information centre would be "leadingedge" and was designed with the community in mind. "The continuous development of technology is always a challenge, but by investing in a new information space and library, Council will give residents - particularly our children and students - the absolute best chance for development and help foster a keen interest in future learning," Mayor Aldridge said.

A dedicated history collection, more public computers and integrated children's learning space were also part of the design. The proposed Community Hub would also provide new meeting rooms and council chambers - all available for use by the community - as well as office space for administration.

The ongoing Salisbury City Centre Renewal also includes development of the Salisbury Oval Precinct, which incorporates upgraded sporting facilities, an integrated recreation area and playground.



A RECORD number of sporting clubs recently hosted more than 160 free trial sessions to help encourage young people aged 3-16 to participate in local sports and recreation.

MAJOR WORKS **UNDERWAY IN** PARA HILLS

A multi-million dollar extension to the Para Hills Library and Positive Ageing Centre to create a modern and multi-functional facility for the community is now underway.

Mayor Gillian Aldridge 'turned the first sod' at a community event on Thursday 19 October to officially mark the commencement of works. The event was an open opportunity to hear more about this exciting development and was attended by interested community members, councillors, local school children and teachers.

The project will see extension works undertaken alongside the existing Para Hills Library and Positive Ageing Centre located at the corner of Kesters Road and Wilkinson Road (Para Hills Shopping Centre) to create the new Para Hills Community Hub. The Paddocks Centre, which has serviced the community well for more than 30 years, will also be relocating into the new facility.

"This project is part of our continual program of work which strives to create opportunities for our community and ensures they remain socially connected and continue to have access to business, training, cultural and life-long learning opportunities," Mayor Aldridge said.



BUSINESS TALK LOOKS TO BRIGHT FUTURE

SOUTH Australia is on the global stage and well positioned to seize emerging economic opportunities.

That was the key message presented by Dr Tom Hajdu (pictured) at the Polaris Business and Innovation Centre's inaugural Annual Business Luncheon. Dr Hajdu is the Chief Innovator for the South Australian Government and owner of companies Distruptor and TomandAndy.

Reflecting on the changes happening in northern Adelaide's economy, Dr Hajdu observed that many other manufacturing-based economies have reshaped themselves and created new economic directions. The elements underpinning those transformations were life changing, world class education, infrastructure, access to capital as well as connectors (tell the story and develop relationships). South Australia – and northern Adelaide – has all of these.

South Australia is now on the global stage and needs to look beyond our local and national borders to take advantage of the opportunities that this brings. The State is part of the fastest growing region in the world – Asia – and should be embracing this. The need to invest in infrastructure that supports jobs growth was highlighted.

Dr Hajdu identified the need to utilise technology, build on our education system and encourage creativity; because creativity leads to innovation which creates jobs.

Dr Hajdu had the following key messages for business owners looking to take advantage of these opportunities:

- · Improve your digital competencies
- Improve your messaging and get your message out social media is important in this space and again this goes back to the first point about digital competencies
- The most important thing is...TRY STUFF. No amount of planning will guarantee success and failure should be embraced

The Business Luncheon was developed to stimulate thinking in northern Adelaide about the reshaping of the region's economy.

The Polaris Business & Innovation Centre – an initiative of the City of Salisbury and supported by the Cities of Playford and Tea Tree Gully – has long been working with existing and prospective business owners to develop their ideas and grow. Increasingly, Polaris is working with growth-oriented businesses and has introduced new international trade, business growth and advanced mentoring programs.


Mayor Aldridge said the benefits of having the breadth of the community's attractions and sector operators showcased on one website were far-reaching. "Salisbury has a great opportunity to increase the size and output of the visitor economy," she said.

The Tourism & Visitor Strategy initially has two core target markets; City of Salisbury residents, businesses and workers; and the broader South Australian intrastate market.

Our population of 140,000 residents is forecast to grow to 151,538 by 2036, so encouraging local residents to 'discover their own backyard' will increase local knowledge, awareness, appreciation and advocacy for Salisbury as a visitor destination. Meanwhile, the South Australian Intrastate market represents 62% of total visits in SA and 37% of visitor nights. This key market, particularly daytrippers, presents a significant opportunity to increase visitation and visitor spend.

HIGH PRAISE FOR TALENTED TUTOR

CONGRATULATIONS to Zoe Gow in being named Tutor of the Year runner-up in the Department of State Development's 2017 Adult Learners' Week Awards.

As our Foundation Skills Project Officer, Zoe was instrumental in developing the Pooraka Farm Community Centre's Accredited Foundation Skills Program. Zoe tailored and continually improved the programs to enable students with differing abilities to participate in a positive learning environment and work towards their goals.

In 2016 almost 60% of program students went on to further study, 17% became volunteers and 14% gained employment.

PARTNERSHIP CLEARS THE WAY FOR STUDENTS

A three-way partnership involving the City of Salisbury and two local schools has helped alleviate local traffic congestion, improved student safety and increased access to recreational space.

Temple Christian College had limited access to outdoor sporting grounds and were utilising the facilities at their neighbouring school – Bethany Christian School. Meanwhile, Bethany Christian School had ongoing difficulties regarding parking and traffic management, particularly during school drop-off and pick-up times. Both schools have also been experiencing growth in student numbers.

Mayor Gillian Aldridge commended both schools for working together to identify their issues and pro-actively approaching Council with a well-developed strategy. "I was very impressed with their partnership project proposal to utilise Fairbanks Drive to address both of the schools' needs," Mayor Aldridge said. "This project is a great example of Council and the community working

together to address local issues using local expertise and life experiences."

The project was jointly funded by City of Salisbury, Bethany Christian School and Temple Christian College. It contained four components which together have alleviated local traffic congestion and provided a shared-use oval for Temple Christian College and residents.

Works included:

- A new roundabout on Byron Bay Drive at an existing entrance to Bethany Christian School
- A new entrance and car park
- A new roadway in Bethany Christian School to link the new carpark and the existing school carparks
- A new irrigated oval on Fairbanks Reserve

"If you want to walk your dog in a safe and enclosed space off-leash at any time, then try one of our nine dog friendly parks," said Mayor Gillian Aldridge. "Our dog parks are great places where you can sit back while your dog explores the area and socialises with other dogs."

Always remember to enter a park with your dog on-leash, make sure it's socialised and remains under effective control even whilst in the dog friendly park.

Can't make it? The City of Salisbury's vast network of parks, reserves and walking trails mean you are always within walking distance of a pleasant environment where you can walk your dog.

All Council reserves and parks are on-leash areas between 8am and 6.30pm. You can take your dog off-leash outside of this time, but only when; it's safe to do so, your pet is

socialised with other people and pets, and you can ensure it remains under effective control by always being able to see it and it responds to your voice command.

Do the right thing and help keep community spaces clean and free of dog waste by picking up after your dog. Council provides dog tidy bag dispensers across our network of parks and reserves, so please carry some with you at all times.

SAFETY TIPS

THERE are a number of ways to ensure that you (and your dog) have a fun and safe festive season.

Secure your yard

Make sure screen doors, window screens, fences and gates are secure, and there aren't any items that will allow your pet to climb up and over the fence.

Fireworks

Many dogs don't like fireworks and can be frightened to the point of jumping or climbing out of yards. Consider placing your dog(s) inside and in a safe space. Lower blinds or close curtains to remove visual stimulation.

Parties

An increased number of people and noise can frighten dogs enough to jump or climb out of yards. Consider placing your dog(s) inside and in a safe space when you are aware of parties being held in your neighbourhood.

ID Check

If you take all these precautions and your dog happens to get out, then proper identification can help ensure your dog is quickly returned home.

FREE SUPPORT FOR AUTO WORKERS

FRIDAY 20 October signalled the end of an era in South Australia when the last car rolled off the production line at Holden's Elizabeth factory.

The skills automotive workers gained through car manufacturing are transferable to new industries, and there is free support available to help them identify these skills and use them to get a new job.

The 'Drive Your Future' program gives current and former automotive supply chain workers access to up to \$2,500 in support services including training, skills recognition, tickets, licences and career coaching, while their partners can access up to \$500 for career coaching services.

City of Salisbury resident and former Hirotec worker Brian used the free support to get the tickets and licenses he needs to stay working in his trade.

"I did my fitter and turner apprenticeship back in the early 1980s and then worked for 22 years, before starting at Hirotec in 2008," Brian said. "I want to stay in my trade; it's my comfort zone I

guess. I thought if I can get some tickets and licenses it might give me a little bit of an edge in an interview situation, make the playing field a bit more even. I can't see why people wouldn't jump at the chance to access funding for skills recognition, tickets and licenses or training of some sort. It's not costing you anything."

Those registered for the program are also able to access Drive Your Future Job Connect – a free service matching former automotive supply chain workers with job opportunities. The program also offers free job preparation workshops covering topics such as resume and cover letter writing, interview skills, applying for jobs and computer skills, as well as mental health and wellbeing support for workers who may be feeling overwhelmed during this period of change.


