- 1.1 At the February 2017 Youth Council Sub Committee meeting, two project teams were established and project team leaders were appointed. Membership of the project teams was detailed in the February 2017 project team report.
- 1.2 The following two projects were initiated:
  - Safe City
  - Pathways and Opportunities

Safe City Project Team update

The Safe City team had initially planned to host an event on Friday the 13th of October, the working title of the event was ‘Safe City Civic Square Event’.

Upon receiving a unanimous vote from all project team members due to the lack of services who could commit to attending the event and upon reviewing the 2016 youth consultations we decided to alter the focus for the project team and cancel the event in favour of a social media campaign through the Youth in Salisbury Facebook page.

By utilizing our online presence it will give us a far greater long term outreach to young people in the community rather than hosting a limited outreach and engagement event, this has also allowed us to make better use of the project team budget.

We have had amazing results from the posts on the page, with the LGBT post receiving a high amount of likes and shares and many positive comments. The posts regarding suicide prevention and homelessness have also been well received

Four more weekly posts from Youth Council’s Safe City Project Team will be shared before the end of the year; the topics will be Alcohol, Drugs, Domestic violence and Mental Health. The mental health post will be scheduled for December as it is a difficult time for some young people and they can face numerous mental health challenges during the festive period.

The Pathways Project Team held an employment expo in partnership with Bagster Road Community Centre in October. The expo was held from 11am-3pm and lunch was provided at no cost to participants.

### 1. BACKGROUND

- 1.1 The staff from Twelve25 participate in the Youth Council Sub Committee meetings to ensure a strong working relationship with Youth Council.

### 2. CITY PLAN CRITICAL ACTION

### 3. REPORT

- 3.1 The report provides Youth Council members with an update and information on centre changes and past and upcoming programs and activities.
  - 3.1.1 Staffing changes have occurred at Twelve25 with Kate Kitching now on maternity leave and Lisa Shaw has assumed the maternity leave Youth Services Officer role until December 2018
  - 3.1.2 Twelve25 has partnered Youth Council with promotions at Salisbury High School on Wednesday 18<sup>th</sup> October, Parafield Gardens High School on Monday 23<sup>rd</sup> October, Salisbury East High School on Thursday 26<sup>th</sup> October. Twelve25 also had a presence at the Youth Council Employment Expo held at Bagster Road Community Centre Inc on Wednesday 25<sup>th</sup> October.

- 3.1.3 In the October school holidays Twelve25 held a Skate Park BBQ in partnership with Youth Council, and then undertook a Gaming Day on 12<sup>th</sup> October at Twelve25. This day was attended by 18 young people and was run in partnership with students from Northern Adelaide Senior College.
- 3.1.4 Wheels in Motion continues to go from strength to strength in a statewide adoption of the model established at Twelve25 in Salisbury with local governments of Port Adelaide, Gawler, Tea Tree Gully and Barossa at various stages of investigation and implementation.
- 3.1.5 Wheels in Motion @ Bagster (a collaboration between ARA, Bagster Road Community Centre and COS through Twelve25) for over 26 year olds has commenced and offered weekly lessons and will continue to expand as mentor availability improves.
- 3.1.6 Wheels in Motion Youth program (to overcome an employment barrier) held a forum for Playford and Salisbury youth on Saturday 28<sup>th</sup> October 2017 and was attended by 62 youth. On a weekly basis over 30 hours of volunteer led student driver training is provided in our car.
- 3.1.7 A Getting your L's course was held in partnership with Bagster Road Community Centre on the week of 30<sup>th</sup> October. 14 of the 16 students passed the test and successfully overcame their barriers to gain their L's.
- 3.1.8 The Basic Car Maintenance Workshop was run on Saturday 25<sup>th</sup> November in collaboration with Peter Kittle Toyota. The workshop covers basics for new drivers of pre-drive checking of the car, changing a tyre, jump starting a car, maintaining fluid levels and understanding servicing requirements.
- 3.1.9 Salisbury eSports is running a TF2 tournament on Saturday 25<sup>th</sup> November with a short workshop on 'Team Work'. The tournament will be streamed live between 3.30pm approx. and 9pm. Salisbury eSports is run by a youth led committee with young people interested in gaming and many who are also students of Northern Adelaide Senior College. Teachers also provide voluntary support to the events.
- 3.1.10 Salisbury eSports is also working towards a LOL tournament with online heats on Friday 8<sup>th</sup> December 2017 and then a final live at Twelve25 on Saturday 8<sup>th</sup> December.
- 3.1.11 The Duke of Edinburgh program run in partnership with Parafield Gardens High School and Duke of Edinburgh nationally has concluded for the year with 31 students successfully developing leadership skills and passing either Bronze, Silver or Gold requirements. This program has been running successfully for 8 years. The graduation event was held on 2<sup>nd</sup> November and was attended by 90 parents and friends.
- 3.1.12 Twelve25 continues to host Cert III in Community Services school based traineeship program which has 18 trainees. The program is a collaboration between DECD, Institute of Social Relations (Training arm of Relationships SA), Maxima Group Training. Two of the 18 students are also undertaking placement at Twelve25 to gain practical experience.
- 3.1.13 Twelve25 four social enterprise models continue to grow and develop.

- 3.1.14 Coffee Connoisseurs operates every Saturday from 7.30am until 12noon depending on weather and crowd servicing the Park Run activity at Carrisbrook Reserve. It operates most Sundays either at a community event or at Carrisbrook Park from 10.30am – 2pm depending on weather. The coffee program has also recently training a small second group of young people to maximize the flexibility of the team. The van has corporate support from Aroma Fresh and Peter Page Holden and is now planning to accredit the training through the Independent Institute (Cnr Ann and John Street).
- 3.1.15 Twelve25's Airbrush Tattoo social model (which has been the longest standing enterprise model) continues to have good bookings with more than 15 events in planning over the summer period. Additional new youth operators have been trained with Airbrush Venturi.
- 3.1.16 The youth tutoring model matching and accrediting university students with families/students needing extra support in English, Math's, Chemistry, Physics and Research Project continues to grow. The project is a mid-way point between Homework Clubs and Commercial tutoring. The student's family pays \$15 per 1 hour for 1:1 session. During the last quarter of 2017 there are 6 active young tutors and 12 student sessions on an average week. Parents have spoken about very significant improvements in student grades with the tutoring support.
- 3.1.17 The fourth social enterprise is the Pizza Gioventu (Pizza Youth) wood fired Pizza enterprise. The enterprise has undertaken a number of high profile events and continues to investigate new ways of getting the enterprise into the community to activate spaces.
- 3.1.18 A weekly partnership continues with Australian Refugee's Association with Twelve25 being a regional hub for Homework Held for CALD young people on Mondays and Thursdays and providing a Tuesday afternoon art program during school terms. Over 20 students attend most sessions.
- 3.1.19 Twelve25 is currently running a tutor led program called 'Summer Coding Club' on Saturdays from 11/11/2017 until Christmas. Coding is the trade of the future. We are looking to expose 11 – 15 year olds to the basic foundation skills. Python language is the core of the program.
- 3.1.20 Northern Adelaide Senior College have continued to deliver significant FLO programs at Twelve25 this quarter including Aerosol Art, Digital Photography, Digital Projection, AFGA (Animation, film and gaming academy) experience and Connect (English, Math's and Careers). This culminated in an exhibition and celebration on Wednesday 15<sup>th</sup> November. This partnership actively supports the learning of over 30 students who are not attending mainstream schools and helps with income to the centre.
- 3.1.21 Jibba Jabba Radio (Youth Radio) continues as a cross local government program (Playford and Salisbury councils) working with PBA FM to train young people to produce a live to air show at 4.30pm every Friday. The last show and graduation celebration for the nine current participants of this round will wind up on Friday 15<sup>th</sup> December 2018 – 5pm-6pm.

Currently we also have a pre-show from 4pm – 4.30pm as a skill development for last terms program and we also produce a live stream to Facebook as a lead in promotion. - 3.1.22 Salisbury City Rotaract Inc continues to meet at Twelve25 fortnightly. It is a youth 18-25 years leadership and community service organization we established in partnership with Rotary Club of Salisbury Inc. Whilst independent, we continue to mentor and support the good work they are doing and how they are engaging with our community. Their membership continues to grow. On 1<sup>st</sup> November 23 young people attended a Professional Development meeting presented by Basil and Roz Coleman on Aboriginal Cultural Awareness. Major activities they have coming up include an engagement in the Christmas parade, a small fundraiser for the ‘End Tracoma project’ and an event supporting Rotaracts Worldwide 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary on 13<sup>th</sup> March 2018.
- 3.1.23 The Christmas closure of Twelve25 reception will be from 4pm December 21<sup>st</sup> 2018 and the centre reopens on Monday 8<sup>th</sup> January 2018 at 8.30am. Over the closure period room hirers continue to have access to the centre, many youth and adult programs continue and a centre staff member is available in emergencies via mobile phone.
- 3.1.24 In the December school holidays Twelve25 (in Partnership with Youth Council members) are planning a Salisbury North Skate Park BBQ and Basketball Challenge on Friday 12<sup>th</sup> January 10.30am – 1.30pm, a Theatre Sports workshop on Tuesday 16<sup>th</sup> January 10am – 2pm ages 12-18, (bookings at <https://theatresportsjan18.eventbrite.com.au> ) and on Friday 19<sup>th</sup> January 2018 an CS:GO eSports tournament 5v5. Watch [www.facebook.com/youthinsalisbury](http://www.facebook.com/youthinsalisbury) for more details.
- 3.1.25 The 2018 Fringe at Twelve25 will be a lot smaller in 2018 with two shows planned. The Salisbury Youth Theatre Group on Thursday March 1<sup>st</sup> at 7pm, will be performing a production called ‘Ashland Falls’ which is dark story about a missing script, murder and a high school. On Saturday 24<sup>th</sup> February 2018 (7.30pm start) after a sold out show in 2017 ‘The 60 Four’ are back. They are SA based young vocal quartet with a 60s tribute – Early tickets are available on December 8<sup>th</sup> at [www.adelaidefringe.com.au](http://www.adelaidefringe.com.au)
- 3.1.26 Planning for 2018 youth programming at the centre is well underway. There will continue to be a strong focus on transition from study to employment (avoiding unemployment), social enterprise and youth leadership.

#### 4. CONCLUSION / PROPOSAL
