1. BACKGROUND

- 1.1 Youth Council held an induction and camp planning in January 2020.
- 1.2 As part of the camp planning, Youth Council members explored the youth issues they believe are relevant for young people in Salisbury. The 2017-2021 Strategic Youth Action Plan objectives and implementation plans were taken into consideration in developing project ideas. A selection of current Youth Council members were involved in the consultation process for the development of the strategy.
- 1.3 A list of 6 project ideas were developed and discussed, and Youth Council members (both in attendance and those not present) were involved in a simple voting process at camp and through a poll on Facebook to select priority projects.
- 1.4 At the Youth Council meeting in February 2020, the Youth Council recommended the establishment of two project teams and recommended appointment of project team leaders to undertake two projects during 2020
- 1.5 The following two projects were initiated:
 - Cultural Awareness; and
 - Environmental

CULTURAL AWARENESS

- 3.1 The aim of this project is to work in partnership with various organisations to improve acceptance and understanding of different cultures.
- 3.2 A project brief has been developed for this project (see attachment 1). Key outcomes for this project include building relationships with services and their young people and delivery of a NAIDOC Week event.
- 3.4 <u>Due to the current COVID-19 restrictions, fortnightly meetings are being held</u> <u>online.</u>
- 3.5 The Cultural awareness team have developed two surveys one will be directed at CALD young people and the other directed at Aboriginal /Torres Strait Islander young people.

The aim of the surveys are to inform the Youth Council of some of the challenges faced by young people from these communities and provide information which will assist future program planning.

The survey links will be posted on the Youth in Salisbury Facebook, shared with young people across Salisbury and youth agencies to share with the young people they work with.

ENVIRONMENTAL PROJECT

- 3.6 The aim of this project is to work with Council staff, local schools and agencies to educate young people on measures we can take to protect our environment
- 3.7 A project brief has been developed (see attachment 2). Key outcomes for this project include an environmental focused event and working with Council staff and schools within the City of Salisbury.
- 3.8 <u>Due to COVID-19 restrictions the Environmental team will develop online</u> <u>content to share with young people.</u>
- 3.9 The team will produce 4 x weekly posts that include videos, gardening projects, photo competitions and DIY projects for the Youth in Salisbury Facebook page, encouraging young people to consider the environment and how they can make changes in their lives to protect it.

4. CONCLUSION / PROPOSAL

- 4.1 Project teams provide the opportunity for Youth Council members to plan, develop and implement key projects that address issues of importance for young people in Salisbury. The project briefs provide structure and clarity regarding the projects and outcomes.
- 4.2 Project teams recently held their first meetings to develop their project briefs. Updates from team leaders will be included in future reports.

1. Background



- To work with Morella Community Centre to host a forum for young people from diverse backgrounds to promote safety online. Local schools will be invited to bring young people to this forum
- In Partnership with Every Life Matters Youth Focus Group and Morella Community Centre Youth Council will host morning tea and mug decorating sessions with members of the CALD Community to improve education and provide strategies for young people dealing with Mental Health challenges.
- Youth Council will seek to partner with Anglicare's New Settlers Program to host several sessions around adapting to life in Australia. These sessions will include Employment and Wellbeing conversations
- Youth Council will work with the Salisbury High School Aboriginal Young Leaders group to plan and host a NAIDOC Week Event
- Youth Council will seek to work with local Aboriginal Artist Shane Cook and Jack Buckskin to deliver 2 sessions of art and culture at Bowden Brompton Community School (Salisbury North Little Para Campus)



From these discussions it was clear that the youth members were passionate about climate change. The Mission Australia Youth Survey, conducted with over 700 young Salisbury residents stated that young people in Salisbury identified the environment as a key topic for young people. The Youth Council discussed this and decided that it was an important project for 2020

1.1 Twelve25 staff participate in Youth Council Sub Committee meetings to ensure a strong working relationship with Youth Council.

3. REPORT

- 3.1 This report provides a summary of youth programs delivered by Twelve25, Community Centre's and the Community Learning Programs team across the City of Salisbury. Programs include:
 - 3.1.1 **Salisbury Fringe** | Twelve25 hosted two Fringe events during February; The Salisbury Youth Performing Arts Group performed a matinee of 'I Hate Shakespeare' to a drama class from Thomas More College, along with an evening performance that attracted 90 guests.

The second event was an Open Mic Night that had approximately 30 guests, with four youth musicians conquering their nerves & a comedian Savage Soph who concluded the night on a high. The event provided a safe space for amateur performers. Feedback received was very positive.

3.1.2 **eSports tournaments & workshops** | 'Model a 3D logo', 'Introduction to streaming/recording', and 'Introduction to Game Footage Highlight Reel' workshops were held at the Salisbury Community Hub during February & March, with an average of six young people attending each session. E-sports tournaments were also planned for April 9th (Rocket League), May 9th (League of Legends) and June 13th (FIFA).

Due to the public health concerns posed by COVID-19 these events were cancelled.

The Digital Literacy Programs Coordinator is currently liaising with Academy Gaming Film & Animation to host the tournaments online.

3.1.3 **South Australian Youth Week** | The Northern Youth Week Festival was going to be held on Saturday 18 April at the Salisbury Community Hub / Civic Plaza. The event would have showcased a diverse collection of local youth and a range of activities including; Elsy Wameyo & band, dot painting with an Aboriginal Artist, Mini Golf, Virtual Reality, eSports & Nintendo Switch Games, Market Stalls, and community groups such as the Salisbury City Rotaract Club, Playford YAC and Every Life Matters - Suicide Prevention Network.

A movie screening of 'Pokemon; Detective Pikachu' was planned for the evening.

Due to the public health concerns posed by COVID-19 the event was cancelled.

In place of this event, Twelve25 showcased Shane Mankitya Cook, Jelly Brown & Elsy Wameyo, along with Salisbury City Rotaract Club and Every Life Matters Suicide Prevention Network - Youth Focus Group by sharing their stories on the YouthInSalisbury Facebook page through-out Youth Week.

3.1.4 Well YOU(th) | This program was originally planned as a 6 week offering, launching on May 7th where young people would learn how to feel their absolute best whilst meeting new people and occasionally getting to hit things! (boxing).

Due to the public health concerns posed by COVID-19 this program was cancelled.

Alternatively this program was delivered online (by Shani Prideaux and supported by Twelve25 staff) over three weeks from 14th May, 4-5:15pm. The sessions gave young people and their parents/guardians tips and strategies to deal with COVID-19 and the heap of challenges it brings. The program is aimed at 12-18 year olds & offered at no cost, and aligns with the Youth Strategic Action Plan in the key area of *Health & Wellbeing*.

3.1.5 **Stand out from the crowd. Employment series** | Young people are invited to connect with industry professionals whilst developing skills to secure a job. Run over 3 sessions, guest speakers will share their stories and employment pathways, followed by workshops to develop young people's job seeking skills. The last session (October 21) includes an Employment Expo, featuring job providers and organisations looking to promote current employment options in the North. Morning tea + lunch included. For 16-25 year olds, topics covered: Retail, Health care and social assistance and Defence & Employment Expo. This event aligns with the Youth Strategic Action Plan in the key area of *Jobs and Education*.

Due to the public health concerns posed by COVID-19 this series was modified to be delivered online through-out June.

- 3.1.6 **The Duke of Edinburgh International Award** | As an open award centre, Twelve25 are delivering Duke of Ed online. The Award registration is open to young people aged 14-24, living in the City of Salisbury. Young people are invited to join the Duke of Ed youth development program to complete their Bronze level Award in only 6 months. They will spend roughly an hour a week in each of the following 3 areas; Voluntary Service, Skill and Physical Recreation as well as completing an Adventurous Journey module. - 3.1.7 **Salisbury Youth Performing Arts Group** | Despite Twelve25 being closed, weekly Thursday afternoon sessions continue to be offered online during Term 2. Twelve participants meet with the facilitator, Sarah from SpaceTime Performing Arts to write a script which will be produced into an audio drama.
- 3.1.8 Australian Refugee Association (ARA) Homework Club | Previously held every Monday and Thursday at Twelve25, ARA's Homework Club has successfully transitioned online for Term 2. - 3.1.9 **AMPED** | AMPED is a program for 9 12 year olds who identify as Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander and live in/around the Salisbury area. During Term 1 it was delivered by Relationships Australia South Australia (RASA) in based from Twelve25. Significant positive feedback was received by RASA regarding the program being delivered in a community space and that young people and their families felt very welcome. The Term 2 program is being hosted online where young people can hang out with Nathan May and Hannah Yates who will teach them Hip Hop, Country and Protest tunes whilst having a yarn and a lot of fun.

- 3.1.10 Stay Connected | The Community Learning Programs team have created a page on the City of Salisbury website showcasing online resources and information for all ages, to assist during this time of change. 'Stay Connected' is a collection of online resources, information and learning opportunities. 'Stay Connected' is divided up into Family and Early Years, Primary Years, Teens, Adults and Multicultural Resourcesresources making age specific even easier to find at www.salisbury.sa.gov.au/Learn/Libraries/Stay_Connected
- 3.1.11 **Youth Support Group Spoonies** | The group usually meet every third Saturday of the month at Pooraka Farm Community Centre from 11am to 12.30pm, are keeping in contact with each other via video link whilst they can't meet at the centre. The group is planning an activity for next year's Youth Week and also assisting with planning the family fun day when it's held later in the year.
- 3.1.12 Burton Community Centre | Burton Community Centre has successfully converted Bionics and English as a Second Language programs online for existing participants in Term 2. They are hosting the Our Strength during COVID-19 Project; capturing stories, challenges and experiences through the lens. Over the coming months they aim to capture the resilience and strength of our community, the ways in which people have coped or not - and what they have done to combat this.
