Salisbury East High School lunch time activities	Tuesday 18th May to June 8th		Wellbeing staff from Salisbury East HS contacted Twelve25 regarding some challenging behaviours between student groups. In collaboration with the Student Wellbeing Officer it was agreed Twelve25 would facilitate lunch time activities for 4 x lunch time performances by young local musicians, including an African drumming workshop.

Getting your L's	APRIL 13 <sup>TH</sup>	20 bookings, 16 attended & passed. 7 volunteers	<p>Getting Your L's is a one day workshop that supports 16-25 year olds to sit their Learner's test to attain their L's. In partnership with TAFE SA, Twelve25 have delivered three workshops with a 100% pass rate.</p> <p>A total of 51 young people now have their Learner's permit as a result of 2021 programs. Twelve25 has recruited and trained 5 new (in addition to the 3 existing) volunteers to support the high percentage of participants who require reading and comprehension assistance.</p>
Wheels in Motion	MARCH 2021 – MARCH 2022	14 new participants	<p>Wheels in Motion is a volunteer mentor driving program that assists young people to obtain their P's by offering a volunteer who supports them attain their driving hours. The program has recently been reviewed, with a range of improvements being implemented. The new offering includes one annual intake, with participants having 18 months to complete their driving hours.</p>
	APRIL 30 <sup>TH</sup>	6 students	<p>Twelve25 is also delivering the Wheels in Motion program in partnership with Salisbury High School, with the vehicle being based at the school every Friday. The first Road Safety Forum was held for 6 students on Friday the 30<sup>th</sup> of April.</p>
Duke of Edinburgh International Award	MARCH onwards	17 young people	<p>Twelve25 are supporting 16 young people working towards their Bronze Duke of Ed and 1 towards their Gold Award. Twelve25 have had 9 expressions of interest since March.</p>

Members of the Salisbury Youth Council; Salisbury City Rotaract and the Salisbury Youth Performing Arts Group also contributed to the painting project. In total 22 young people were involved.  An additional 6 young people were involved in a gardening workshop which was run in partnership with Paralowie Garden. Young people creating new wicking pots at the front of Twelve25.

E-sports	JUNE 5 <sup>TH</sup>	The League of Legends E-sports tournament is planned for June 2 <sup>nd</sup> to 5 <sup>th</sup> . Online heats will be held Wednesday the 2 <sup>nd</sup> and Thursday the 3 <sup>rd</sup> of June, with the finals held in person at the Salisbury Community Hub on Saturday the 5 <sup>th</sup> of June.

- 4.1.1 *‘Plastic lids are made from different polymers and usually don’t have a PIC (Plastics Identification Code, i.e., running triangles with a number stamp) so it can be difficult to identify what they are made from. Having said that, lids and caps are often high density polyethylene (HDPE) or polypropylene (PP) - both of which can be recycled if we can get them to our downstream processors. The best way to enable this to happen is for residents to secure lids in a clear plastic (preferably PET (ie PIC #1) container like the photo on our website. This way our MRF staff can see what is in the container. I have some more information here on the website: <https://www.nawma.sa.gov.au/recycle>.*
- 4.1.2 *If the lids can be sorted into pure streams by our downstream processing partners, both HDPE and PP can be recycled – there is some info about this between 2:35 and 3:16 in our recycling video:*
