SUMMARY	This report presents the Provisional Program for the National General Assembly (NGA) of Local Government taking place in Canberra in June 2022 and addresses attendance and voting guidance at the NGA.

RECOMMENDATION

1. Appoints Cr _____ as the City of Salisbury voting delegate to be registered to attend the National General Assembly of Local Government being held in Canberra from 19 to 22 June 2022 [in person OR online].
2. Approves for the Mayor and Chief Executive Officer to meet with the City of Salisbury voting delegate prior to the 2022 National General Assembly of Local Government to provide voting guidance on motions in the best interest of the City of Salisbury, in the absence of any specific direction from Council on the motions.

1. BACKGROUND

- 1.1 The National General Assembly (NGA) of Local Government will be held 19 to 22 June 2022 at the National Convention Centre, Canberra. The theme for the 2022 NGA is 'Partners in Progress'.
- 1.2 At its meeting on 28 February 2022, Council resolved as follows:

3.1.2 2022 National General Assembly of Local Government - Call for Motions and Attendance at Assembly

That Council:

1. *Notes that motions are being called for submission by 25 March 2022 for the National General Assembly of Local Government being held in Canberra from 19 to 22 June 2022 and that a voting delegate is to be appointed by Council.*

Attendance at Assembly

- 3.1 A provisional program has been released and is attached to this report for information.
- 3.2 Elected Members were advised by email on 29 March 2022 of indicative costs for attendance, as outlined below, and seeking registrations of interest in attending.
- 3.3 Anticipated costs for full registration are:
 - in person registration \$3,100
 - online registration \$690
- 3.4 At the time of writing this report, no Elected Member has expressed an interest in being registered.
- 3.5 Council representation at the General Assembly is not compulsory, however the City of Salisbury has generally always been represented by an Elected Member.
- 3.6 Should Council resolve to register a representative from the City of Salisbury, a motion appointing that person as voting delegate will need to be adopted to enable the representative to vote on motions at the General Assembly.
- 3.7 Funds for attendance will be taken from the Council Delegate budget line rather than Individual training and development budgets.

Voting on Motions at Assembly

- 3.8 The Australian Local Government Association (ALGA) have advised the NGA Business papers will not be available until two weeks prior to the NGA (approximately 6 June). This will not provide enough time for presentation of the motions to a City of Salisbury formal committee in June (the Governance and Compliance Committee is scheduled for Monday 20 June, the papers for which will need to be finalised by Thursday 9 June). For the 2021 NGA there were 102 motions on the agenda.
- 3.9 Due to the timing of the release of the Business Papers, there are two options available to Council in order to provide guidance to Council's voting delegate in relation to NGA motions:
 - 3.9.1 **CEO and Mayor**

The CEO and Mayor (and other relevant staff if required) meet with the voting delegate and provide prior guidance on voting for NGA motions reflecting the best interests of the City of Salisbury.

3.9.2 Special Council Meeting

Council determines that a Special Council Meeting be convened following receipt of the NGA Business Papers to enable Council to direct the voting delegate in relation to voting for each motion.

4. CONCLUSION / PROPOSAL

- 4.1 Council is asked to determine if an Elected Member or Members should be registered to attend the NGA, and if so, who will be the City of Salisbury voting delegate.
- 4.2 Should Council wish to register a delegate, a choice of 'in person' or 'online/virtual' registration will need to be made.
- 4.3 The NGA motions are intended to provide the basis of policy setting and representations to the Federal Government for the ALGA Board on issues of national significance to Local Government. They are not motions that, if passed, become binding on the ALGA Board.
- 4.4 Option 3.9.1 is recommended as the preferred approach for Council to provide guidance to the NGA voting delegate.

For more than 50 years Valmai (Val) Dempsey has dedicated her life to St John Ambulance.

In 2020, Val faced her biggest challenge yet – first with the 'Black Summer' bushfires, followed by the COVID-19 pandemic.

In response, she led 40 fellow volunteers as they supported fire-affected communities during the emergency that stretched over many weeks, and when the pandemic hit, she personally contacted every volunteer to check they were 'doing OK' in terms of welfare, mental health and morale.

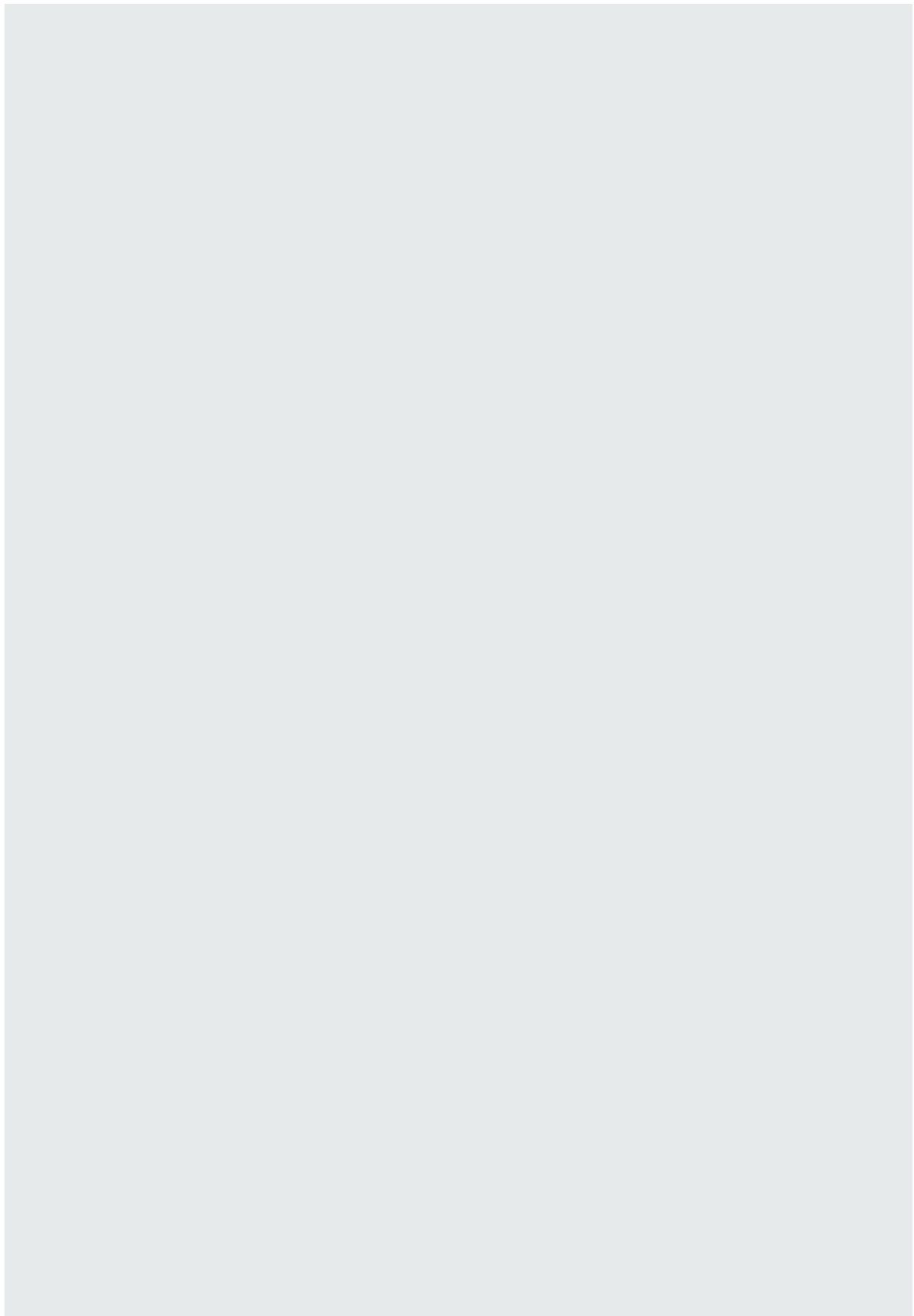

SUMMARY	The pilot off leash greyhound event was conducted on the 6 November 2021 and this report provides an update on the event, feedback from the attendees and from other Councils to host a calendar of off leash greyhound events in future.

RECOMMENDATION

That Council:

1. Notes the success of the pilot off leash greyhound event along with the very positive feedback and level of satisfaction with the Jenkins Reserve facility.
2. Approves the Administration conducting up to two off leash greyhound events per annum subject to approval from the Dog and Cat Management Board and Greyhound as Pets SA.
3. Approves the Administration writing to the Dog and Cat Management Board to review the legislative and policy requirements for off leash greyhound events to enable third party organisers to host and conduct greyhound off leash events to reduce the administrative burden and costs on the City of Salisbury and local government sector.

1. BACKGROUND

- 1.1 Further to Item 2.4.1 Off leash Greyhound Event presented to Works and Services Committee on the 16 November 2020, it was resolved that:

- 1.1.1 *Council endorses a pilot off leash greyhound event subject to consideration as a New Initiative Bid in the 2021/22 budget process.*
- 1.1.2 *Council administration liaises with other metropolitan Councils to determine the extent of support for a network of Councils to establish an Annual Event calendar for off leash greyhound events across the metropolitan Adelaide area.*

- 1.2 This report presents the outcomes of the pilot off leash greyhound event held on the 6 November 2021 along with feedback from the attendees and results from consultation with other Councils to establish an event calendar.

2. CONSULTATION / COMMUNICATION

2.1 External

2.1.1 Off leash greyhound event attendees

2.1.2 The following local government authorities:

- City of Playford
- Town of Gawler
- City of Tea Tree Gully
- City of Charles Sturt
- City of Port Adelaide Enfield
- Alexandrina Council
- City of West Torrens

3. REPORT

- 3.1 Under section 45C of the *Dog and Cat Management Act 1995* (the Act) it is a legal requirement that all greyhounds be on-leash, at all times, and muzzled (unless an exemption is obtained by the owner), when away from private property.
- 3.2 This requirement applies to any public place including designated off-leash areas and fenced dog parks. This legislation overrides any council by-law permitting dogs to be off-leash, unless an exemption has been approved by the Dog and Cat Management Board (DCMB).
- 3.3 Councils can apply for an exemption under section 80A of the Act to undertake a greyhound off-leash event in a public place such as a fenced dog park.
- 3.4 In line with Council resolutions and support through a New Initiative Bid, an application was made to the DCMB and Greyhounds as Pets SA (GAP SA) to hold a dedicated off leash Greyhound Event at a fenced dog park within the City.
- 3.5 In consultation with GAP SA, Jenkins Small Dog Park was identified as the only suitable park for the off-leash greyhound event due to its size and unobstructed layout.
- 3.6 This park provided the least risks to the dogs and the best opportunity for reducing distractions that could cause unwanted issues.
- 3.7 With support from GAP SA and the required application including Risk Management Plan, approval was sought and an exemption granted by the DCMB for the pilot off leash greyhound event.
- 3.8 On 6 November 2021 the pilot off leash greyhound event went ahead and involved 4 x 45-minute timeslots. Fifteen minutes was provided between each timeslot to enable sufficient time to clear the area and check the reserve prior the next group commencing.
- 3.9 Each session was able to cater for a maximum of 12 greyhounds. From 48 available places, a total of 29 greyhounds were booked in for the event.

Attendee Feedback

- 3.10 During the event all greyhound owners provided positive feedback and were very thankful for the opportunity to exercise their pets.
- 3.11 Shortly after the event all attendees were sent a survey to formally gather feedback. A summary of the feedback is included in Attachment 1 - Off Leash Greyhound Event Survey. Main highlights for the feedback include:
- 3.11.1 Overall satisfaction rating with the event - 85% Very satisfied to satisfied
 - 3.11.2 Duration of time slot – 93% Very satisfied to satisfied, with some respondents saying time slot was too long as greyhounds don't need much time
 - 3.11.3 Session times - 93% Very satisfied to satisfied, with the morning time slots preferred and weather must not be too hot
 - 3.11.4 Event location - 93% Very satisfied to satisfied
 - 3.11.5 Fenced exercise area - 100% Very satisfied to satisfied
 - 3.11.6 Amenities - 85% Very satisfied to satisfied with some concern with lack of toilet. Toilets were available, but not sign posted effectively.
- 3.12 In relation to the questions surrounding more events and when an event should be held, the feedback was again very supportive.
- 3.12.1 100% of respondents supporting another event:
- preferably held in Autumn or Spring;
 - in the morning;
 - monthly or a calendar of events with other Councils; and
 - 85% of respondents are willing to travel to other Council locations.
- 3.13 The feedback from the trial event conducted on 6 November 2021 from both attendees and staff indicate this was a positive and well received event.

Council feedback regarding potential shared events across the district

- 3.14 Council Administration contacted the following local councils to gauge interest in undertaking an off leash greyhound ground event and then developing a calendar of events:
- City of Playford
 - Town of Gawler
 - City of Tea Tree Gully
 - City of Charles Sturt
 - City of Port Adelaide Enfield
 - Alexandrina Council
 - City of West Torrens

- 3.15 The outcome of the consultation found that only the City of West Torrens was considering holding greyhound events for the upcoming financial year. The City of West Torrens was interested in establishing a calendar to ensure the events hosted by them do not clash with any conducted by Salisbury.
- 3.16 Several other councils showed interest in the idea. They were keen to learn from our experience, but were not considered hosting an event at this time, however they may do so in the future and are willing to re-engage at that time.
- 3.17 Other councils that had hosted events in the past had decided not to reapply due to the process to obtain the exemption and the resources required to hold the event. That is, the events must be monitored by council staff and an exemption granted every year by the DCMB.
- 3.18 The current legislative framework provides an administrative burden and resource demand requiring Council Authorised Officers to monitor an event resulting in few events being held.
- 3.19 In the absence of legislative change, a maximum of one or two events per annum could be supported within current resource levels and operating costs.
- 3.20 Consideration could be given to seeking legislative or policy review by the DCMB to allow for these events to be run by independent organisations such as GAP SA. This events could then be supported by allowing access to Council facilities through a reserve hire agreement that provides exclusive access. This would enable non-council staff to manage events reducing the administrative burden and costs to councils.

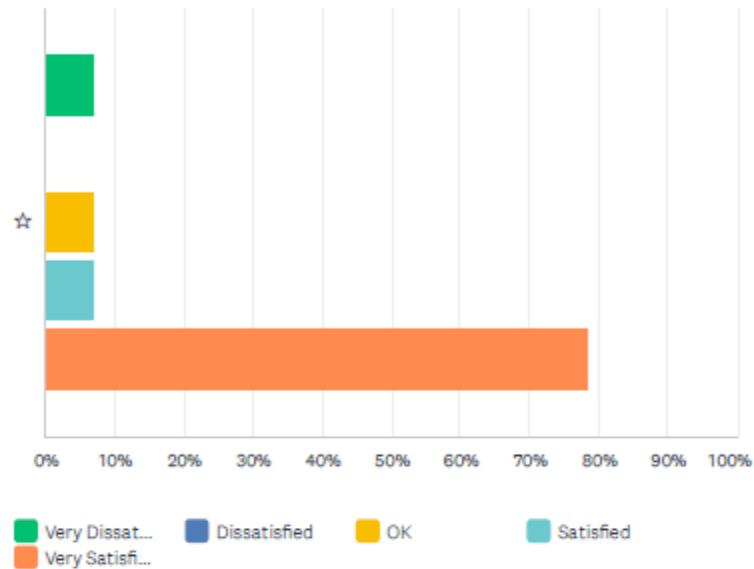
4. CONCLUSION / PROPOSAL

- 4.1 Given the success of the pilot event, positive feedback received satisfaction with the Jenkins Reserve facility, and staff learnings it would be possible for the City of Salisbury to conduct one or two off leash greyhound events annually within current operating budgets.
- 4.2 In line with the feedback received, it is proposed that morning event(s) would be planned to be held during Autumn and/or Spring with a combination of 30 minute and 45 minute session times to cater for different preferences.
- 4.3 Administration would coordinate potential dates with other councils that introduce similar events to enable the greyhound community to attend events on different days.
- 4.4 It is proposed to write to the DCMB seeking a review of the legislative and policy requirements for off leash greyhound events to enable third party organisers to host and conduct greyhound off leash events to reduce the administrative burden and costs on the local government sector and encourage more off leash events to be held.

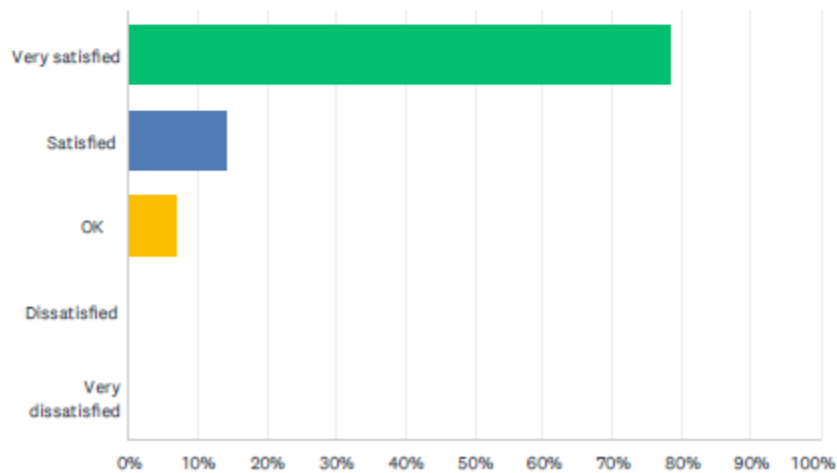

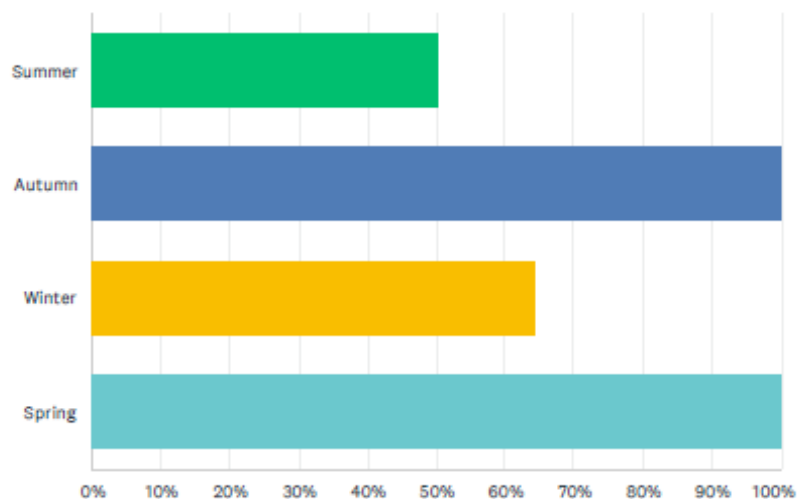

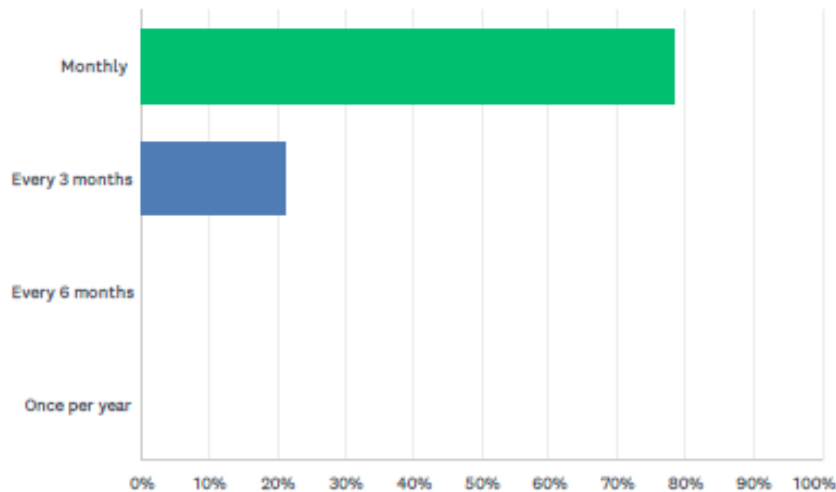

Q9 How many times per year:

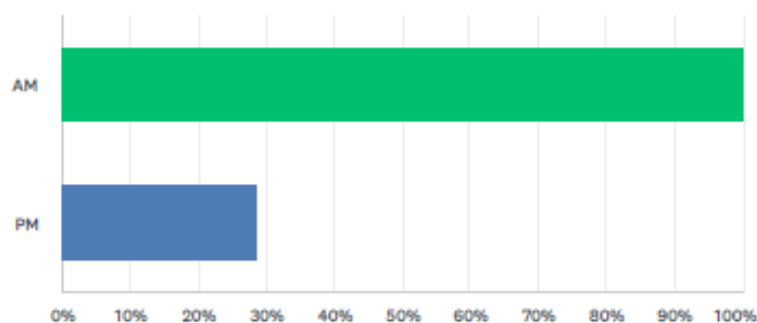

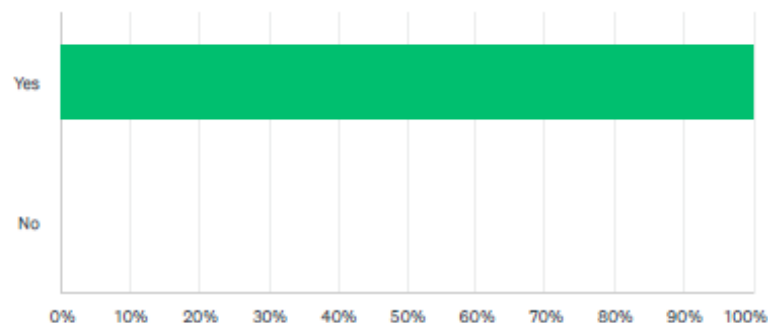
