- 3.3 The Teams have been meeting fortnightly and both have progressed in the delivery of their respective projects with evidence of a range of positive outcomes for Salisbury's young people.

- 4.1 The Team Leaders will continue to coordinate the meetings, with their Teams collaborating with Salisbury's young people and community organisations to finalise their projects by November 2022.

**Political Awareness Project Team update, May 18 2022**

A political awareness forum was held at Twelve25 on Wednesday May 11 2022, which was attended by 25 young people.

The forum was held to inform young people about the importance of voting, understanding how to vote and looked at the different political parties, and what their platforms are.

The forum was supported by the Australian Electoral Commission who provided polling booths, ballot boxes, and useful resources to assist young people to navigate the voting process. A mock election was held to enable young people in attendance to get a feel for the process of voting on election day.

Special guests included; Shawn Lock; Liberal member for Spence, and David Deex; Greens Candidate for Spence who participated in a Q&A session with the young people.

The project team will now progress onto planning a similar forum prior to the Local Government elections, which will include inviting the Mayor and Elected Members. This forum will be advertised on social media and will promote the importance of voting in local elections.

**Youth Homelessness Project Team update, May 18 2022**

This project team plan to prepare backpacks for young people who are experiencing homelessness.

This will be achieved by placing donation boxes at local schools to collect food, toiletries, sanitary items, socks, scarves, blankets and beanies.

Four local high schools, along with the Salisbury City Rotaract have agreed to host a donation box. In addition to this, the team will purchase pens, note books and bags from their project budget.

The completed bags will be distributed to homelessness services in partnership with; the Salvation Army Youth Homelessness Service and HYPA.

In addition to the backpacks, the team will also plan a youth consultation with young people experiencing homelessness. or being at risk of homelessness.

Insights gained from the consultation will be added to existing data being collected for the new Youth Action Plan.

- 2.2 In summary, the Division delivered;
  - 2.2.1 Programs which engaged 100 young people;
  - 2.2.2 10 activities; and
  - 2.2.3 A Youth Week event.

<b>EDUCATION &amp; EMPLOYMENT</b>			
White Card	13 April	1	Due to not meeting full capacity, the delivery of this course is being adapted to individual enrolment rather than a group booking. The young person, who has registered, has been transferred to another training opportunity, delivered by Red Earth Training Solutions.
First Aid	27 April	7	As part of Twelve25 Youth Centre's youth employment program, participants gained their First Aid and CPR certificates.
Business Start Up Program	28 April	5	The Cities of Salisbury and Tea Tree Gully partnered to deliver a 'Getting Ready for Business' workshop. The interactive workshop consisted of youth entrepreneurs sharing their business journeys and developing their ideas. Feedback was extremely positive, with participants reporting they learnt a great deal.
	26/27 May	-	Due to the timing of the report, an update for this workshop, delivered by Young Change Agents at Para Hills High School, will be provided at the June meeting.
Prepare & Serve Espresso Coffee	3 - 5 May	3	Due to not meeting full capacity, the delivery of this course is being adapted to individual enrolment rather than a group booking. 3 young people have been transferred to another training opportunity, delivered by HITsa Training and Employment, Salisbury.
Duke of Edinburgh Award - Leadership Program	17 May	10 attended 15 registered	Onboarding of a Duke of Edinburgh Project Officer has been completed and the first session of the program was facilitated by Scouts focussed on communication, team work and leadership. The program will continue until November.

<b>ACTIVE &amp; CREATIVE LIFESTYLES</b>			
Games Night Pilot	25 March - 6 May	10 regular weekly attendance	The pilot Games Night was delivered on Friday afternoons for 6 weeks. Participants valued the social connections and links to the centre, with many participants then registering for 'The Hunt' and Duke of Edinburgh program. Staff and the young people are currently exploring how the games nights can become sustainable.

<b>SA YOUTH WEEK 2022</b>			
Salisbury East High School - Expo	13 May	12	The Digital Literacy Programs Coordinator and Twelve25 staff were invited to attend Salisbury East High School's Youth Week event. Students were able to try the virtual reality equipment and learn about the youth week events offered at the City of Salisbury.
Robotic Smart Car Workshop: Coding	16 May	12	The Mawson Centre hosted a workshop for young people aged 11-14, allowing them to explore the concept of building and programming their own smart cars. The workshop was very successful with multiple parents offering positive feedback and requesting future similar programs be offered. The next steps will be to identify the level of interest by offering 'Pop-up tech' sessions.
Paint in 3D using Virtual Reality	18 May	20	This workshop was hosted by the Digital Literacy Programs Coordinator at the Salisbury Community Hub and participants made 3D art using Virtual Reality.
The Hunt	21 May	19	The Salisbury Youth Council and Twelve25 team hosted the Scavenger Hunt, which saw 6 teams racing around the city centre completing a variety of fun tasks such as handstands, Harry Potter Broomstick impersonations and air guitar. Participants reported they had a lot of fun completing the hunt, which was followed by enjoying grazing boxes and music by Hannah Yates at Twelve25 Youth Centre. The Mayor attended, presenting the winners with their medals & vouchers to Project Break, Para Hills.

Northern Youth SALA Festival	1-31 August	Twelve25 Youth Centre is hosting a free online exhibition and competition during the SALA Festival. Entries for artwork close on 25 July and artists can submit up to 4 works. 2. Notes that an outcomes-based approach in delivering future youth employment programs will enable these programs to be flexible to meet the needs of young people and emerging trends within the City of Salisbury.

### 1. BACKGROUND

- 1.1 Twelve25 has delivered a range of employment and enterprise focused programs over many years, all of which have undergone internal feasibility reviews. The evaluation of program viability and impact is an essential element of program delivery, given that trends, funding, viability and opportunities are constantly evolving.
- 1.2 In March 2021, Council approved a Twelve25 Employment Offering report for the delivery of a Youth Business Start-up program and Youth Qualification program. A total budget of \$19,700 was allocated to the program per financial year for 3 years.
- 1.3 The Youth Qualifications program was proposed with a budget of \$9,800 per financial year and would provide for 153 young people to access a subsidized qualification.

- 1.4 The qualifications included Barista, White Card, Pool Lifeguard, First Aid and Working with Children's Clearance.
- 1.5 This fee structure proposed that young people/families, who possess a health care card, receive a 75% subsidy on course fees, with a 25% subsidy for other young people living in the City of Salisbury. This approach was designed to support the young people, who need the assistance most.
- 1.6 The Youth Business Start-up Program was proposed with a budget of \$9,900 per financial year. This was designed to provide for 140 youth places for wrap around business support to include an 8-week incubator program, workshops and motivational talks to help young people develop practical skills needed to start or grow their business.

## **4. REPORT**

- 4.1 The Youth Business Start-up Program and the Youth Qualifications Program are initiatives, which have been built on previous Twelve25 programming.
- 4.2 It has become evident in the delivery by Twelve25 staff this year that both programs have not met the program's expectations and need to change in order to meet the market demands and skill areas that young people would like to develop.
- 4.3 The Administration has identified improvements to the programs, which look to mitigate participation barriers, support young people to achieve relevant emerging industry outcomes, and strengthen key relationships with local schools and youth agencies.

- 4.4 A key strategy to achieve optimal reach and impact for both programs, is to partner with local high schools for the delivery of the programs. Salisbury East, Para Hills and Salisbury High Schools have already shown interest in partnering with Twelve25 to deliver these programs.
- 4.5 The following improvements for the Youth Qualification Program include:
- 4.5.1 Introduction of a standardised 75% subsidy for all City of Salisbury's young people rather than the current sliding subsidy scale;
  - 4.5.2 Adapting the subsidy arrangement will enable the City of Salisbury to partner with local schools to deliver these qualifications, which would not be possible with the current stepped subsidy arrangement; and
  - 4.5.3 Increasing the scope of the types of qualifications available to young people rather than the current fixed suite will allow the program to adapt courses to meet the emerging trends and industry demands. For example, there has been little interest for the proposed Pool Lifeguard training, but more interest for the Responsible Service Alcohol training.
- 4.6 The following improvements for the Youth Business Start-up include:
- 4.6.1 Partnering with the Polaris Centre, the City of Tea Tree Gully and other business mentoring groups in the next phase of delivery due to their established experience in the youth entrepreneurial sector;
  - 4.6.2 Having the flexibility to offer a diverse range of tailored workshops and 1-1 sessions to meet the needs of young people that reflects the stage of their business rather than the current 8-week model; and
  - 4.6.3 The Administration notes that implementing these improvements may reduce the overall number of workshops and numbers of participants, however it is anticipated that the outcome in implementing these changes will create improved outcomes for young entrepreneurs in Salisbury and greater overall impact.
- 4.7 The Administration is currently exploring opportunities for City of Salisbury staff to provide additional mentoring support and advice to the young people participating in both these programs.
- 4.8 The Administration also notes that using a more outcomes-based approach in delivering future youth employment programs will enable the programs delivered by Twelve25 to be flexible to ensure they can meet the needs of young people and emerging trends within the City of Salisbury.
- 4.9 These outcomes could include:
- 4.9.1 Develop essential life and vocational skills;
  - 4.9.2 Increase opportunities within a range of industries;
  - 4.9.3 Develop an increased likelihood of securing meaningful employment; and
  - 4.9.4 Experience increased confidence and social connectedness.

**5. CONCLUSION / PROPOSAL**

- 5.1 Twelve25 Youth Centre is the heart of youth service delivery in the City of Salisbury, providing programs and activities for young people aged 12 to 25 who live, work, study or volunteer in the area.
- 5.2 In March 2021, Council approved a Twelve25 Employment Offering report for the delivery of a Youth Qualification program and Youth Business Start-up program.
- 5.3 It has become evident in the delivery that both programs need to adapt to the market demands and skill areas that young people would like to develop.
- 5.4 This report includes program improvements and notes that a more outcomes-based approach in delivering future youth employment programs will enable the programs delivered by Twelve25 to be flexible to meet changing needs. These will continue to be reported to Council.
