1. BACKGROUND

- 1.1 Section 10 of the Youth Council Sub Committee - Terms of Reference outlines the purpose and governance of Project Teams and these teams are established at the first Youth Council sitting for the year.
- 1.2 At the February 2022 Youth Council meeting, two Project Teams were approved;
 - 1.2.1 Youth Homelessness; and
 - 1.2.2 Political Awareness.
- 1.3 Since February, these Teams have been meeting regularly to develop their projects alongside a range of City of Salisbury staff, organisations and young people and have achieved much learning and success to date.
- 1.4 These projects will be completed by November 2022.

4. REPORT

- 4.1 At the February Youth Council meeting,
 - 4.1.1 Two Project Teams (Youth homelessness and Political awareness) were approved; and
 - 4.1.2 Project Team Leaders were nominated
- 4.2 These teams have met regularly to develop their projects alongside a range of City of Salisbury staff, organisations and young people and have achieved much success to date.
- 4.3 From engagement with local youth homelessness services, the Youth Homelessness team has undertaken a donation drive across multiple sites and schools in Salisbury. To date, there has been an overwhelming response from community.
- 4.4 The Duke of Edinburgh participants are engaged to pack the donated goods into backpacks and these will be presented to the youth homelessness services at the event at Twelve25 on the 12 August 2022.

- 4.5 The Political Awareness Team are currently planning a series of social media posts to provide information to young people about voting in local elections. The team are working closely with the City of Salisbury's Governance team to get an understanding of the caretaker provisions and align the initiatives accordingly.

5. CONCLUSION / PROPOSAL

- 5.1 These teams have worked hard to deliver projects that will benefit young people of Salisbury since February 2022, and both have achieved some excellent outcomes and learnings to date.
- 5.2 Project Team Leaders will continue to coordinate meetings and collaborate with young people and community organisations, with their projects being completed by November 2022.
- 5.3 Further updates will be provided at the next Youth Council meeting on 11 October 2022.

Political Awareness Project Team update

The Political Awareness team is currently developing a series of social media posts in preparation for the local government elections. These posts will include links to helpful websites to assist young people to understand the voting process, make more informed choices and encourage them to vote.

The project team will also develop social media content which introduces team members, sharing insights such as why they are passionate about increasing political awareness amongst young people.

The Team is working alongside Governance to get an understanding of the caretaker provisions and align the initiatives accordingly.

Youth Homelessness Project Team update

The Youth Homelessness team have been collecting donations throughout June & July to assist young people who are experiencing, or at risk of becoming homelessness. Collection boxes are currently placed across 6 sites within the City of Salisbury, with an overwhelmingly positive response from the community.

Below are images of the donation boxes and some of the donations collected so far;



The Salisbury Neighbourhood House Board and Salisbury City Rotaract have each pledged \$200, with the project team deciding to invest these funds on extra backpacks and first aid items.

A launch will be held on August 12 at Twelve25, (in conjunction with the Twelve25 re launch) where the project team will speak about the project and present homelessness services with the backpacks. Larni Robb, Youth Participation Coordinator; Youth Outreach from The Salvation Army, Ingle Farm will be a guest speaker and discuss the youth homelessness climate and her role in delivering services to vulnerable young people.

Elected Members within the City of Salisbury have been invited to this event

The project team are also participating in 'Walk a Mile in my Boots' to raise funds for the Hutt St, Centre. Where they will walk to raise funds for people experiencing homelessness

- 1.1 Twelve25 Youth Centre provide a range of programs and activities for young people aged 12 to 25 who live, work, study or volunteer in the area.
- 1.2 Twelve25 staff regularly work alongside young people and youth organisations to deliver diverse and dynamic initiatives that meet our young people's needs and aspirations.

4. REPORT

- 4.1 This report provides an update of youth programs and events delivered by the Community Capacity & Learning Division during June and July 2022.
- 4.2 In summary, the Division delivered;
- 4.2.1 Three courses with 41 young people gaining qualifications in both White Card and First Aid;
 - 4.2.2 Supported 241 young people through programs and youth activities;
 - 4.2.3 Facilitated a dedicated youth networking event with 46 youth professionals in attendance, and
 - 4.2.4 Actively engaged with two local high schools.
- 4.3 Another key highlight for the Twelve25 team has been securing \$10,000 from AnglicareSA to fund Wheels in Motion participants to complete their required 4 professional driving lessons.
- 4.4 In addition to this funding, AnglicareSA have also committed to funding young people to complete the test and pay for their L's permit. This partnership is an excellent example of a mutually beneficial long-term relationship, which supports young people to overcome financial barriers.

- 4.5 Highlights of upcoming programs for August to October include;
 - 4.5.1 SALA competition and exhibition during August;
 - 4.5.2 Duke of Edinburgh skills sessions, including public speaking and ‘Building a resume that works’; and
 - 4.5.3 Further delivery of a range of subsidised qualification courses.
- 4.6 Additional information on the range of programs and events can be found in Attachment 1.

5. CONCLUSION / PROPOSAL

- 5.1 The programs and services offered across the Community Capacity and Learning Division are provided to Youth Council members to share these initiatives with the wider community of young people.

Business Start Up Program	26/27 May	15	Following on from the June report, <i>Young Change Agents</i> delivered a two-day 'Explorer program' at Para Hills High School. Students refined their problem statements, developed 'how might we...' statements, and ideated to develop innovative solutions to their identified problems. Students worked hard to develop budgets, research their ideas and innovate with feedback from their peers. 8 business ideas were generated, which each team/individual presented to a panel of judges (including their headteacher and a council staff member). Ideas included; a mobile beauty service, a platform to connect local businesses to consumers therefore reducing the risk of scams, and a business selling beautiful fidgets made from beads, to help reduce anxiety. All students did a fantastic job and really made the most of the program.

Northern Youth Services Network	9 June	46	The Cities of Salisbury, Playford and Tea Tree Gully bring together the northern youth sector to advocate, develop and connect. This meeting was held at the Twelve25 Youth Centre, with presentations by the Department of Human Services, the Department for Education and a young person who shared her inspirational journey to overcome life challenges through her connectedness to community via volunteering.
