SUMMARY	This report provides information on the outcomes of the City of Tea Tree Gully's Reusable Nappy and Sanitary Item Rebate Review and provides an update on the partnership activities the Administration has undertaken to enable free access to period products across the City of Salisbury.

RECOMMENDATION

That Council:

1. Notes that Council provided TABOO Period Products with a \$5,000 Community Grant in August 2022 to provide free period products within Twelve25 Youth Centre and other community facilities and to provide education to the City of Salisbury regarding period poverty and sustainable practices.
2. Notes that Council will not pursue a Reuseable Nappy and Sanitary Item Scheme.

1. BACKGROUND

- 1.1 At the 12 April 2022 Youth Council meeting, **Motion YC6** was carried to further explore the feasibility of a trial offering a reusable cloth nappy and sanitary product rebate. Council resolved:
 - 1.1.1 Notes that the final outcomes of the City of Tea Tree Gully's Reusable Nappy and Sanitary Item Rebate Review will inform further decisions around scoping work;
 - 1.1.2 Approves the investigation of partnership opportunities, including funding, with established organisations and social enterprises to enable free access to period products across the City of Salisbury; and

- 1.1.3 The Youth Council continue to be informed on the matter and a report be provided following the Tea Tree Gully report outcomes.
- 1.2 In May 2022, the Administration met with representatives from TABOO to discuss partnership opportunities with the City of Salisbury with a focus on young people.
- 1.3 From these discussions, TABOO Period Products applied for funding to provide free period products within Twelve25 Youth Centre and other appropriate community facilities, and provide education to the City of Salisbury regarding period poverty and sustainable practices
- 1.4 On 22 August 2022, Council provided TABOO Period Products with a \$5,000 Community Grant to deliver this program.
- 1.5 At the same meeting, Council also approved the City of Salisbury Sustainability Strategy 2035, which includes a number of actions that Council will undertake in its own operations and how we will support the community to act sustainably.
- 1.6 The Strategy includes five overarching themes;
 - 1.6.1 Biodiverse Salisbury
 - 1.6.2 Carbon Neutral Salisbury
 - 1.6.3 Climate Resilient Salisbury;
 - 1.6.4 Resourceful Salisbury; and
 - 1.6.5 Waterwise Salisbury.
- 1.7 Consultation has taken place with the Sustainability Strategic Coordinator to discuss the potential alignment of this pilot with the City of Salisbury's Sustainability Strategy 2035 with particular reference to Resourceful Salisbury, which includes a range of actions to address waste management.
- 1.8 There are a number of actions identified in this strategy for implementation to address waste management in Salisbury that aim to achieve similar outcomes of the City of Tea Tree Gully's Reusable Nappy and Sanitary Item Rebate Pilot (i.e. to reduce the amount of waste disposed to landfill):

Existing

- 1.8.1 Partnering with Green Industries SA and NAWMA to expand green waste service by providing green bins, kitchen caddies, compostable bags and educational material to residents;
- 1.8.2 Maintaining a weekly kerbside collection service and delivering educational resources for our culturally and linguistically diverse community to assist to reduce waste generation and increase resource recovery;
- 1.8.3 Building a Circular Economy through developing new markets and using recycled materials; and
- 1.8.4 NAWMA conducting audits of all kerbside bins every two years.

New

- 1.8.5 Implementing waste, recycling and organics bin systems in Council facilities supported by education and resources;

- 1.8.6 Applying the waste hierarchy to Council operations, services, events and facilities;
- 1.8.7 Providing options for the collection of specialised waste items (e.g. batteries/mobile phones) in Council facilities;
- 1.8.8 Reviewing our procurement policies to encourage recycled material in purchasing to deliver sustainability outcomes and stimulate the circular economy; and
- 1.8.9 Advocating to State and Federal Government for collaborative research opportunities to build a circular economy.

3. REPORT

- 3.1 The City of Tea Tree Gully's Reusable Nappy and Sanitary Item Rebate pilot offered residents rebates to encourage the use of environmentally friendly products including items such as reusable cloth nappies, swim nappies, baby wipes, nursing breast pads and sanitary items.
- 3.2 A detailed review of the pilot was conducted and was presented to the City of Tea Tree Gully Council on 23 August 2022.
- 3.3 The following insights were noted as part of this report;
 - 3.3.1 A relatively low resident uptake with only 183 rebates issued;
 - 3.3.2 Of those issued, 53 were for cloth nappies (\$3,800) and 130 (\$9,700) for reusable sanitary items resulting in a relatively high per resident cost;
 - 3.3.3 20 of the 25 (80%) respondents from their survey indicated that they were already using cloth nappies and only 5 residents transitioned to cloth nappies, indicating that the program was not a significant incentive for more people to switch to cloth nappies;
 - 3.3.4 The majority of the respondents indicated that they still used disposable nappies at times of convenience such as for childcare or overnight;
 - 3.3.5 No analysis was undertaken on the % nappy waste generated during/after the trial in comparison to before the trial;
 - 3.3.6 No acknowledgment was mentioned of the increased water and energy use needed to wash reusable nappies; and
 - 3.3.7 All respondents indicated that they would 'Likely' or 'Most likely' continue to use the reusable nappies highlighting the potential benefits of a cumulative and transitional program.

- 3.4 The Administration notes the community and social value that this scheme has provided to the City of Tea Tree Gully. However, the City of Salisbury Sustainability Strategy 2035 highlights a range of existing and new actions, which have been developed specifically to address the current needs of Council's community and provide the best value for money in return.
- 3.5 As such the Administration does not recommend further investigation nor implementation for a Reusable Nappy and Sanitary Item scheme for the City of Salisbury.
- 3.6 The Administration notes the City of Tea Tree Gully report did not indicate how much landfill waste was reduced, therefore its effectiveness could not be fully established. If further information becomes available on the effectiveness of the pilot program in regards to reducing waste to landfill, it may be reconsidered.
- 3.7 As part of the Community Grant funding with TABOO Period Products, the City of Salisbury is currently developing a sustainable model to provide free period products within Twelve25 Youth Centre and other appropriate community facilities. TABOO is also currently planning alongside Twelve25 to deliver educational workshops at Twelve25 to raise awareness of the community issue.

4. CONCLUSION / PROPOSAL

- 4.1 Whilst the Administration recognises the community and social value that a Reusable Nappy and Sanitary Item Rebate pilot scheme provides to the community, it is not recommended for further investigation nor implementation.
- 4.2 The City of Salisbury Sustainability Strategy 2035 highlights a range of different waste reduction actions, which have been developed specifically to address the current needs of Salisbury's community and provide the best value for money in return. Therefore, the Administration recommends the focus remain on delivering these actions.
- 4.3 The City of Salisbury is currently developing a sustainable model to provide free TABOO Period Products within Twelve25 Youth Centre and other appropriate community facilities.
- 4.4 TABOO is also planning to deliver educational workshops at Twelve25 to raise awareness of the community issue.

1. SA Youth Parliament Update

1. BACKGROUND

- 1.1 YMCA South Australia Youth Parliament is a non-partisan program providing a platform for young people aged 15 - 25 to have their say on important issues, build skills and parliamentary understanding. It focuses on personal development, empowerment and connecting politicians and decision makers with youth voices and opinions.
- 1.2 The Youth Parliament is an annual program, running March to August, and includes mentoring, a training weekend, a week-long camp and access to Parliament House.
- 1.3 Every year, young leaders come together to learn about public speaking, parliamentary etiquette, bill development and youth advocacy. They share their big ideas, discuss the challenges facing South Australia and create solutions in the form of Youth Bills.
- 1.4 The cost to participate in the program is \$480 per person and every year the City of Salisbury offers sponsorship opportunities for a number of young people living in Salisbury to attend.

3. REPORT

- 3.1 In February 2022, an online application was made available for young people living in the City of Salisbury to request sponsorship to attend the 2022 Youth Parliament and this opportunity was promoted on the City of Salisbury website and social media channels.
- 3.2 Information was also shared directly with local schools and the Youth Parliament Task Force, which is a group of young volunteers who develop and deliver the Youth Parliament and Youth Press Gallery programs each year.
- 3.3 Requests for sponsorship are reviewed by the Community Planner Youth Participation and the Team Leader, Twelve25 Youth Centre.
- 3.4 Eight sponsorship positions were available and eight sponsorships requests were received and approved. Three individuals had to withdraw from the program due to personal reasons. The funding for these three sponsorship places has been reallocated for the 2023 Youth Parliament program.
- 3.5 The final group, who were sponsored by the City of Salisbury, consisted of three Salisbury Youth Council Members and two young people from the broader Salisbury community.
- 3.6 Feedback from the participating young people was overwhelmingly positive about the opportunity the experience provided them to develop both personally and professionally.
- 3.7 The attachment, which includes further feedback on the benefits and impacts of the program from participants, has been developed by Sharifullah Habibi, a Youth Council member and Youth Parliamentarian in 2022.

4. CONCLUSION / PROPOSAL

- 4.1 Youth Parliament is a beneficial program for young people to be involved as it provides core skills in governance processes, parliamentary understanding, and personal development.
- 4.2 Sponsorship provided by the City of Salisbury is vital to ensure that all young people have financial access to participate, and through Twelve25, the City of Salisbury will provide further sponsorship for young people living in Salisbury to participate in the 2023 program.

The Salisbury Council sponsored 8 young people to attend the Youth Parliament Program 2022.

3 Young people had to withdraw for personal reasons and the funds have been held by allocated to City of Salisbury sponsorship for 2023. The non-partisan program empowers young people to be advocates for their community and all youth parliamentarians went on a six-day camp to develop their leadership skills and connect with politicians. Participants debated the bills they had created with their respective committees regarding issues that are important to young people. This year participants also had the opportunity of visiting the governor’s house. Participants had a great week of fun, learning and debates on issues the bills that they had created in a six-month period.

Sharif and Brooke were in the Indigenous Affairs and Reconciliation committee. This committee introduced the *Indigenous Foster Care Reform Bill 2022*. The aim of this bill is to ensure there is indigenous cultural connectedness in the foster system, to reform current practices to prevent child removal and to bring indigenous voices to represent those in the foster system. After some passionate and important speeches, the bill passed in both the upper and lower house.

- 1.1 Section 10 of the Youth Council Sub Committee - Terms of Reference outlines the purpose and governance of Project Teams and these teams are established at the first Youth Council sitting for the year.
- 1.2 This year, the two Project teams included Youth Homelessness and Political Awareness.
- 1.3 Since February, these Teams have been meeting regularly to develop their projects alongside a range of City of Salisbury staff, organisations and young people and have achieved much learning and success to date.

4. REPORT

- 4.1 The two Project Teams have met regularly to develop their projects alongside a range of City of Salisbury staff, organisations and young people, and have achieved much success to date.
- 4.2 Since the last update, the Youth Homelessness team presented 30 backpacks to the youth homelessness services at a Twelve25 event and attended a community dinner hosted by Life Church at Para Hills Community Hub in September to distribute excess good collected to families in need.
- 4.3 The Political Awareness team are currently developing a series of social media posts to provide information to young people about voting in Local Government Elections. The team are also working closely with the City of Salisbury's Governance team to get an understanding of caretaker provisions and align the initiatives accordingly.
- 4.4 The team is planning to host a panel discussion on October 5 at Twelve25 focusing on democracy and the importance of voting in Local Government Elections. In addition to the panel, young Journalist, Sowaibah Hanifie will open the night and Youth Council will facilitate a World Café as part of the nights activities with young people moving around tables to address different questions.
- 4.5 Further information, including feedback from the youth homelessness services, images from the event and information on the panel discussion are included in the Attachment.

5. CONCLUSION / PROPOSAL

- 5.1 The two Project Teams have worked hard since February 2022 to deliver projects that have benefited young people of Salisbury, and both have achieved some excellent outcomes and learnings to date.
- 5.2 Both teams will finalise their projects in the coming weeks and a final update will be provided at the next Youth Council meeting in December 2022.

Project Team Updates October 2022

Political Awareness Project Team update

The Political Awareness team is currently developing and scheduling social media posts in

preparation for the local government elections. These posts have included links to helpful websites to assist young people to understand the voting process, make more informed choices and encourage them to vote.

The project team also developed social media content which introduced team members, who shared insights such as why they are passionate about increasing political awareness amongst young people.

The last part of their project is to deliver a panel/world café forum to discuss democracy and the importance for young people to be involved in voting in Local Elections.

Guest Speaker, Sowaibah Hanifie will open the event. Sowaibah is an award winning journalist. She's worked with the ABC for five years and in 2020 was named Young Journalist of the year when she was working in the Northern Territory. She is a firm believer that the media plays a huge role in a well-functioning democracy. She enjoys sharing her experiences working in news and encouraging people to see the importance of the media.

The team is working alongside Governance to ensure they are being mindful of the caretaker period and what they can still achieve as a team during this period.

Youth Homelessness Project Team update

The Youth Homelessness team have been collecting donations throughout June & July to assist young people who are experiencing, or at risk of becoming homelessness. Collection boxes were placed across 6 sites within the City of Salisbury, with an overwhelmingly positive response from the community.

The Salisbury East Neighbourhood Centre Management Committee and Salisbury City Rotaract have each pledged \$200, with the project team decided to invest these funds on extra backpacks and first aid items.

A launch was held on August 12 at Twelve25, (in conjunction with the Twelve25 re launch) where the project team shared about the project and presented homelessness services with the backpacks. A guest speaker, Paul Mundy, Team Leader Burlendi Youth Housing spoke about the youth homelessness climate and his role in delivering services to vulnerable young people.

Feedback from services

Burlendi Youth Housing; *"this was a wonderful project and we really appreciate you thinking of us. These backpacks will be well used by young people who enter our service and other young people who we may not be able to assist immediately"*

Service to Youth Council; "In the name of SYC, I would like to thank you and all the young people who had endless efforts preparing the relaunch and donating the useful bags. I want to let you know that all donations made have safely arrived at The Foundry – SYC's youth hub, and the first young person was already complemented with a bag and a jumper. He was thrilled with that"

It was a privilege to be part of your kindly action and see the young people engaged in making the difference by supporting the community.

The team also attended a Community Dinner hosted by Life Church at Para Hills Community Hub on September 15 to distribute excess donations to young people and families in need

The project team are participating in 'Walk a Mile in my Boots' to raise funds for the Hutt St, Centre. Where they will walk to raise funds for people experiencing homelessness

4. REPORT

4.1 This report provides an update of youth programs and events delivered by the community capacity & learning division during August and September 2022.

4.2 In summary, the Division delivered;

- 4.2.1 Four courses with 33 young people gaining qualifications in White Card, Pool Lifeguard, Prepare and Serve Espresso Coffee and Provide First Aid;
- 4.2.2 Supported 942 young people through programs, partnerships and youth engagement activities; and
- 4.2.4 Actively engaged with three local high schools.

4.3 Highlights of the past 2 months include;

- 4.3.1 Duke of Edinburgh skills sessions, including self-defence and volunteer clean up activity;
- 4.3.2 \$6,000 “Youth Off the Street” Scholarship awarded to Nuam one of the Duke of Ed participants and regular to Twelve25; and
- 4.3.3 SALA competition and exhibition.

5. CONCLUSION / PROPOSAL

5.1 The programs and services offered across the Community Capacity and Learning Division are provided to Youth Council members to share these initiatives with the wider community of young people.

Youth Programs and Events

Highlights

Duke of Edinburgh Program

As part of the physical activity component for completing the Duke of Edinburgh program, Bronze awardees have been participating in Self Defence, facilitated by Budo Kan of Australia. These sessions were also open for other young people to join this weekly free program to feel empowered and learn how to protect themselves.



On 27th August six awardees spent four hours volunteering their time to clean up part of our Salisbury CBD. They found lots of rubbish, broken glass, needles, masks and much more, collecting over 12 bags of rubbish and 5 bucket loads of glass. It was great to see this amazing bunch of young people take pride in our community and having fun. The walking trail along Paternoster Row to the foot bridge looks 100% better. It was great to see community members noticing the difference and complimenting their work.



Youth Off the Street-Scholarship

Twelve25 staff supported a Duke of Edinburgh awardee, Nuam to apply for Father Chris Riley's Youth off the Street National Scholarship Program. This scholarship provides \$6,000 towards educational and training goals over 2 years, staff support/ mentoring and attends an award ceremony. This is only available for 20 lucky young people across Australia. Nuam has been successful in this scholarship, to help her get in to her chosen field as a Police Officer.



Northern Youth SALA Festival

As part of the City of Salisbury's SALA program, Twelve25 hosted a free online exhibition and competition with 46 pieces of artwork in varying mediums featured.

There were five categories for prizes to be won - People's Choice, Mayor's Choice, Judging Panel - artists Melita & Keira Scott, Paint n Pot Kit and Youth Council Choice. There were over 3,000 people choice votes.

Through the Events, Arts, Place Activation & Curation Officer artists have been invited to exhibit their artwork in a live youth exhibition from 19 December 2022 to 13 January 2023 in the John Harvey community hall at the Salisbury Community Hub.
